Dear San Bernardino Board of Supervisors.

We are writing to state our disagreement regarding the zoning change proposal and ask you to deny the change from RL40 to R1 for the Moon Camp property.

When the property was originally purchased, it was understood that the zoning was RL40. The purchaser knew what they were buying at the time. Because of the natural state of the land, it has become important as an access point to the lake for wildlife including mountain lion, bobcat, black bear, deer, etc. The shoreline and snag trees on the property are important to bald eagles and osprey for hunting and fishing purposes (see photos below).

The bald eagle issue was addressed in the 2011 DEIR which stated that there would be significant adverse impacts to the bald eagles; this was based only on the wintering eagles present at the time. In 2012, a pair of bald eagles built a nest within one-half mile of the Moon Camp site. Since that time, we now have permanent resident nesting eagles on the north shore of Big Bear Lake. We have witnessed numerous times eagles perched on snag trees on Moon Camp property. They fly back and forth over the Marina Point property to fish in the lake where a proposed harbor would be.

This development would definitely affect the nesting and fishing eagles a short distance away. How can you create a long term management plan without a proper study and analysis of the success of permanent resident nesting eagles on and near the Moon Camp property? A zoning change as proposed by this development requires must be in the public interest.


The Planning Department cites the need for housing, however there are currently over 600 homes for sale (150 more than the prior year). Having been in Big Bear for over 30 years, we do not see the need especially in Fawnskin as there's a small market for homes due to the distance from stores, ski slopes, restaurants, etc. Resort patrons and visitors prefer to be on the south shore to access the abundance of these amenities.

Another priority argument against this development is the high fire rating of the area. Many homeowners are having their fire insurance coverage cancelled due to the extreme fire risk. With only three roads into and out of the Big Bear Valley, emergency evacuation routes are often closed due to fire and accidents. With the proposed increase in density, evacuation would be worse as well as impair access for emergency vehicles. Please don't let the Big Bear Valley suffer a fate similar to Paradise, CA.

The proposed Moon Camp development, with the increased density zoning change, is not in the public interest. Please consider the future safety of the residents and visitors of the Big Bear Valley, as well as the harm to plant and animal species, before the financial gain to the County coffers and developers.

I am asking you to DENY the detrimental zone change and project proposal for the Moon Camp development in Fawnskin. Increasing housing density in this area would cause major irreversible harm to the bald eagles that nest nearby and forage on the site.

The most recent Draft Environmental Impact Report (2011) concluded there would be significant adverse impacts to bald eagles. That analysis was based on bald eagles only wintering in the valley for a few months a year. Beginning in 2012, a pair of bald eagles began nesting within $\frac{1}{2}$ mile of the project site. The much more significant impacts this project would cause based on this key change has never been evaluated. Project proponents have attempted to conceal the true impacts to bald eagles by creating what they call a 'Long Term Management Plan.' Without proper analysis, any management plan is invalid.

Planning staff cites the need for housing as more important than any harm caused to bald eagles. This area is in the heart of a National Forest, in a unique, rural area on the north side of the lake. The project site itself contains 3 species of plants and rare habitat that do not exist anywhere else in the world! Less than 1/3 of this special habitat is planned to be conserved. With over 600 homes currently for sale in this small valley (150 more than a year ago), there is no justification to declare that a need for housing overrides significant harmful impacts to bald eagles.

Any zone change, as this project requires, must be in the public interest. This area is already rated such a high fire risk that many local homeowners have had their insurance cancelled. A housing density

increase along the National Forest boundary would escalate the fire risk. The area is already ranked in the top 1% as having the most hazardous, least adequate fire and emergency evacuation routes in the state. This zoning change would further aggravate that potentially dire evacuation deficiency.

To approve this project, County decision-makers would be saying they care more about adding luxury houses and a private marina than they care about preventing harmful impacts to the bald eagles, to our National Forest, to our residents and to our visitors. Please DENY the detrimental zone change and project proposal for the Moon Camp development in Fawnskin.

I have lived in San Bernardino County since 1975, when I lived in Redlands and attended the University of Redlands. After graduating, my husband and I moved to Chino Hills to purchase our first home and start our family. We have raised our children who all attended Chino Valley Unified School District schools, while I have worked for the same school district for close to thirty years.

We own a second home in Big Bear in the Moonridge area. We are very passionate about both Chino Hills and Big Bear as we spend time in both cities. We understand the need for high density housing, but the development planned for Moon Camp is uncalled for, except to line the pockets of developers and contractors.

Drive around Big Bear.... count the number of homes with 'For Sale' signs. What does that tell you? It tells you there is a significant issue going on in the area. Then go for a hike, follow the trails, walk along the path on the north shore east of Fawnskin... what does that tell you? That tells you that the open areas are needed for the wildlife to continue to prosper and live freely. It tells you that the people want the open areas protected for the wildlife and the use the trails and paths provide.

Watch the video of the eagles of Big Bear. There is no other source of great action and real life that is appropriate for all age levels to watch. Watching the eagles is peaceful, humorous, and even heartbreaking sometimes when nature takes one of its own. However, the eagles are prospering in the nest tree on the north shore. Why? Because they found an area protected from humans and have a food source in the lake close to their nest. Why would 'we' (really you, depending on how you vote) change that? What message would you be sending to the children who will take your places in the years to come? How will you explain that vote to your children, your grandchildren, or the school children?

With all of the business of work and family, it is the hiking trails, the open areas, the walking paths, and the wildlife that need to be protected the most. The eagles have no voice...except for our voices! During hatching season, the area around the eagle's nest on the north shore is protected for a reason... to protect the eagles. Do the right thing, which is sometimes hard to do, especially with the pressure of developers.... deny the changes requested for Moon Camp. Be the person who speaks up for those with no voice... the eagles. Protect the area from the zone change and the developers.

As an educator, teaching young people to respect the wildlife is one of the lessons that is so very important. The coyotes in Chino Hills and in other cities have had their land reduced which leads to increased negative encounters. Please do not allow the eagles in Big Bear to follow along that same path.

More homes are not needed. Desired, but not needed. There is no housing shortage, as evidenced by the numerous 'For Sale' signs that are in front of homes that do not sell.

As far as needing another private marina, have you driven around the lake and observed how many boat launches are not in the water? Do we need more boat launches or another marina? Taking a boat out on the lake on July 4 is great family fun. The lake gets crowded and the wake from boaters who do not respect the other boaters or the shoreline is tough to watch. Do we need more... I personally do not think so. I would rather speak up for the eagles, as they teach us more about life and how the future will unfold than we want to admit. Respect the eagles, their habitat, and the area they hunt for food to eat and feed their young. That protection is far more important than another development of houses and another marina.
