I am a part-time resident of Big Bear Lake and have lived in the Boulder Bay area since 2010. Granted this is not a very long time, but our family has always been aware of the possibility of this area in question being developed across the lake from us.

I am certainly sympathetic to the rights of land owners and developers, but this development should be denied by the County. It would completely alter the tranquil nature of the Fawnskin, North Shore area which currently lacks the kind of higher density development that is the hallmark of the South Shore area of the lake.

The North Shore is the place one goes to seek quiet, to walk or bike along the Alpine Pedal Path, to hike the lesser-traveled trails near the Pacific Crest Trail. And it is the home of what has become a celebrity eagle nest that has garnered nation-wide attention these past few years.

To build a high-density, luxury development within a half mile of this nest will irrevocably change the natural landscape of the area and will most assuredly limit the ability of the eagles to find food for the eaglets each year. It will increase traffic in what is now a relaxed, quiet community that attracts others for that very reason.

There is no need for more housing in Big Bear, and certainly not more high-end housing. Six hundred homes are currently on the market in Big Bear Lake. On our street alone, in one block, there are three homes for sale.



Dear Friends:

I understand that approval of the above development will be considered at your Board meeting on Tuesday, October 8. While I cannot be there in person, I would urge you to consider the project in the broader context of the public good, which I have no doubt was a major factor in your decision to serve as a county supervisor.

The EIR and numerous comments submitted previously document the negative impacts of this project, which I will not repeat here in detail. Suffice it to say that a major tourist attraction to Fawnskin and Big Bear has become the bald eagles who just in the last few years have nested and produced chicks, rather than returning to Montana to reproduce. Anything that disrupts the eagles nesting here will also have a significant negative impact on tourism and our local economy. The eagles have already decamped once to their current nesting area on Grout Bay from an area on the north shore when a developer removed eagle perches. Further disruption can only hurt our fledgling tourist industry based on these magnificent birds.

Housing of the type proposed for Moon Camp is far from being in demand now, and seems unlikely to be in the forseeable future. A quick drive through Fawnskin will show a large number of homes for sale at any given time, as has been the case consistently in my 45 years here. Adding more high end housing simply gluts the market and lowers the value of existing homes.

Finally, you are undoubtedly looking at the potential new tax revenue. However, the added strain on already strained infrastructure such as traffic, air quality and water availability must be weighed against this.

Let me finish by stating that I have actually "put my money where my mouth is". There were four large, undeveloped parcels in Fawnskin several years ago (including Moon Camp). I bought one of them, a 30 acre parcel, and have donated most of it to the San Bernardino Mountains Land Trust to be preserved in perpetuity. I am not a particularly wealthy person, but used all of an inheritance I had, plus some savings, to do this. My belief is that this area on the north shore of

Big Bear Lake is very unique, with unparalleled plant and animal life sitting very close to 10 million people, so preserving it is important. Once it is gone, it is gone forever.

I certainly do not expect others to be similarly generous. However, in a conversation with the developers of Moon Camp some years ago, they stated that they were offered appraised value by the Forest Service. They rejected the offer as it did not meet their profit expectations. Thus they have had, and will have in the future, opportunities to sell the property without development, but perhaps not at the excess profits they would like. I would hope that satisfying their perhaps unrealistic expectations in this regard over the public good would not be the driving factor in your decision, and urge you to turn down this proposed development at this time.
