Alcohol and Drug Impaired Driver Vertical Prosecution Program

Application Description:

The County District Attorney's Office (or City Attorney's Office) will assign a specialized team to prosecute alcohol and drug impaired driving cases. The DUI prosecution team will handle cases throughout each step of the criminal process. Prosecution team members will work to increase the capabilities of the team and the office by obtaining and delivering specialized training. Team members will share information with peers and law enforcement personnel throughout the county and across the state. The office will accomplish these objectives as a means to prevent impaired driving and reduce alcohol and drug-involved traffic fatalities and injuries.

#### **Problem Statement:**

San Bernardino County is located in Southern California, east of Los Angeles and Kern Counties and North of Riverside County. San Bernardino County stretches from those inland county boarders to the boarder with both the states of Nevada and Arizona. Measuring 20,105 square miles, San Bernardino County has the distinction of being largest geographical county in the contiguous United States.[1] Within those 20,105 square miles is approximately 10,000 miles of roadways including 6 Federal Interstates Highways, 2 Federal U.S. Highways, and 18 State Highways.[2]

Although vast, our population of 2,187,665 people is mostly concentrated in the southwestern region of the county. Home to 24 incorporated cities and 56 unincorporated communities[3], only 22% of our land is dedicated to housing, industrial, utilities, agriculture, transportation, and parks leaving the remainder open desert and land. [4]

Major Interstates traverse our county through the open desert as well as through our cities; Intestate 10 travels through San Bernardino County all the way to Florida; Interstate 15 stretches from the Mexican border to the Canadian border passing traversing San Bernardino County from its border with Riverside County all the way to the Nevada State border; and I-40 stretches throughout the entirety of Mojave desert crossing the nation to North Carolina. These highways make San Bernardino County a vital transportation corridor for residents, tourists, and commerce. That also means that these roads are traversed by many more people and vehicles than just the local population. Our highways are shared by small commuter cars to the largest tractor-trailer allowed to haul goods across the interstate system and every vehicle in between. However, it is that population of 2,187,665 people who are mostly affected by the collisions in the county.

The largest county in the nation, San Bernardino County is comprised of vast deserts, large stretches of highly traversed highway, and some of the hardest working families in the state. The roads are heavily traveled by families, workers, travelers, and commerce. The danger on the roads is high and the need for traffic safety is great.

#### Problem Statement:

Due to its size and the vast nature of the highway systems that connect the physically largest county in the nation, it should come as no surprise that San Bernardino County is home to the number one deadliest roadway in the state of California.[1] Interstate 15 (I-15) between Exits 138 and 129, also known as the Cajon Pass to locals, is the deadliest stretch of highway in California. Released in 2024, data indicates that the fatalities in the Cajon Pass rose from 33 in 2018 to 45 in 2022. That's almost one fatality per week on a 4.5 mile stretch of Interstate. Although the Cajon Pass is known by most of southern California as a connector to Las Vegas, for locals it is a commuting highway that connects the County's High Desert Area to the rest of the Inland Empire, Orange County, and Los Angeles County. The Cajon Pass is the connection to jobs, entertainment, and family. Not only do we have the most dangerous Highway in the State, but we also have some of the most dangerous Cities in the Nation to drive in. In October 2024, Consumer Affairs released a report discussing the most dangerous drivers in the Nation by City. The cities of Victorville and San Bernardino were among the top 5 most dangerous in the Nation.[2] The city of Victorville ranked second most dangerous, with 3.0 alcohol-related fatalities per 100,000 and 11.2 fatalities per 100,000 involving speed in 2022. The city of San Bernardino ranked fourth with 7.7 alcohol-related fatalities per 100,000 and 11.3 speed related fatalities per 100,000.

Focusing on driving under the influence related collisions, San Bernardino County had 1,297 DUI related collisions in 2022 which was 12.3% of all crashes within the county.[3] There was a slight decrease in 2023 to 1,246 DUI related collisions, making up 12.0% of all collisions within the county.[4] Of those collisions in 2022, there were 110 DUI collision related fatalities making up 24% of all collision related fatalities in the County.[5] This fell only slightly below the California State percentage of where DUI related fatalities made up 28.1% of all collision related fatalities. The highest percentage of drivers in DUI related collisions in San Bernardino County are between the ages of 20-29 years old followed by 30-39 years old.[6] With 27% of the County's population being between the ages 25-40 years old, it is the largest portion of the county's population that is involved in these collisions. Of these DUI related collisions, there were 76 fatalities in 2023 and 348 fatalities and serious injuries.[7]

Our community is plagued with the task of commuting the longest distance in the state on the deadliest highway in the state and within the most dangerous cities to drive in the nation. Although intoxication related collisions and fatalities are reducing they are reducing with the state and national averages, yet still maintaining the rankings as the most dangerous highway and cities to drive in. The communities within the county need help combatting these issues.

3. Define the target population the grant intends to serve and how they are affected by the problem(s).

#### **Problem Statement:**

When you look at the county as a whole, our population density is 109 persons per square mile. But, noting that our residents populate that southwestern region of the county that number changes to a much more 3,236 persons per square mile.[1] Based on County data from 2022, 27% of the population is between the ages of 25-40 years old, 23% of the population is between 45-64 years old, and 11% is between the ages of 18-24 years old.[2] The average household size is 3.2 persons with 39% of households in the county having children under in the age of 18 in the house and 23% of families with children under 18 being single parent households.[3] Although 87% of our population graduated from high school in 2021/2022, only 23% of our population over 25 years old has a bachelor's degree or higher.[4] Of the population, 1,023,600 people in November 2022 were employed in the labor force, 42,400 were unemployed and there was a 4.1% unemployment rate.[5] The median house-hold income was \$74,846 and only 52% of buyer could afford an entry-level home priced at 85% of the median.[6]

The communities in this county are blue collar workers supporting their families while striving to make the American dream. Commuting on these highways is a daily necessity for the residents of San Bernardino County. According to the 2021 U.S. Census San Bernardino County Residents the highest average commute time in the region with 32.2 minutes (Riverside County averaged 32.1 and Los Angeles averaged 29.2 minutes) which was above the state average of 27.6 minutes. [7] San Bernardino also had the lowest percentage of workers working from home at 13.6%. Finally, San Bernardino residents commute daily to their jobs with more than 466,000 residents commuting outside of San Bernardino County for work and only about 357,000 people commuting into San Bernardino County to work. [8]

The people of San Bernardino County are struggling to survive in a California economy that is outpacing what their households can afford. Most of the community is forced to go into the workforce out of high school for lack of access and lack of financial availability to reach beyond while still supporting their families. Commuting on the most dangerous highways and within the most dangerous cities and on major transportation corridors is their only option. When a family in San Bernardino County is affected by a loss from a DUI related collision, whether it is property, or worse – a life, they lose access to their lifeline: whether it be their vehicle that was totaled and their only source of transportation, or a parent who was the only source of income. Insurance from the defendants in these cases, if the defendant has insurance, may not be enough or is stalled by the criminal justice process and the families are left, not only with injuries and family losses, but with loss of income or a means to make a living. # **Proposed Solution**

#### Equity:

San Bernardino County is the largest county in the nation with a diverse population. The residents come from a diverse racial and socio-economic backgrounds who often make up both our victims and our defendants. Given the size of the county, many times victims and defendants come from outside of the county, as they have been traveling through or simply visiting the county. Having the Office of Traffic Safety Grant activities centered in one location, we treat all victims equally with the dignity and respect, across the spectrum of communities located within the county. Likewise, we treat defendants equally, according to the law and the facts of their individual case.

Our DAs and investigators travel, and our Victim Advocates are strategically placed in order to cover the large geographical area that the county encompasses ensuring that resources and access to justice to the rural communities of the county who reside a long distance from victim service centers or courthouses ensuring all communities within the county receive the same access to services and justice no matter what their personal situation is.

#### Strategies:

As a prosecuting agency, the San Bernardino County District Attorney's Office will work towards the goals of eliminating traffic fatalities and injuries on California roadways through specialized and equitable prosecution of driving under the influence cases by vertically assigned prosecutors, collaboration with local law enforcement agencies on education and enforcement measures, as well community outreach, awareness and education. Through the help of our Victim Services, we will ensure that all members of the community have access to victim services and the justice system and the services necessary to rebuild and repair. The Office of Traffic Safety has previously awarded a grant to the District Attorneys office for the use of two prosecutors as well as a dedicated investigator. These two prosecutors have become specialized in the prosecution of driving under the influence cases with the most serious of consequences. Handling a caseload of mostly Watson murders and gross vehicular manslaughter with intoxication, these prosecutors have prosecuted the most serious of DUI offenses, have assisted in training other prosecutors in handling DUI related cases, and trained law enforcement throughout the county. With the assistance of their dedicated investigator the prosecutors have secured 20 intoxication related convictions totaling 92 years 8 months + 45 years to Life in State Prison, approximately 3.5 years county jail (1,288 days), 10 years suspended, and 23 years of probation. However, the need is greater than two attorneys and an investigator can handle and many of the intoxication related fatality cases must go to non-specialized prosecutors.

To address the needs in the San Bernardino County communities the specialized prosecutors will continue to liaise with the traffic teams around the county building better cases and relations. The prosecutors and investigator, in continuing to build their relations with local law enforcement, respond to major intoxication related traffic collisions to build stronger cases. The team of prosecutors and investigator will continue to collaborate with the local agencies and take part in DUI Checkpoints, Saturations, local school education, and Mothers Against Drunk Driving Events. The collaboration with law enforcement on events and operations within the community brings awareness to the issues of driving under the influence, provides education and enforcement to the communities that help to reduce intoxicated driving.

The team of prosecutors and the investigator will build relations with outside agencies as well. The relations with outside agencies will expand the knowledge of the team, helping the team to better address the needs of their community. The team will also attend CTSRP, NHTSA, and other relevant trainings to further their expertise, knowledge, and skill allowing them to better support the communities they serve.

The San Bernardino County District Attorney's Office, being committed to confronting vehicular homicides continues to maintain a Vehicular Homicide Unit within their Bureau of Investigation. The investigators in that unit, collectively, have expertise in imaging and analyzing data from Event Data Recorders (EDRs) as well as vehicle infotainment systems. The office also possesses and maintains the necessary equipment in order to retrieve the crucial data from the EDRs and infotainment systems. This allows the Office to assist agencies countywide with data retrieval which aids in the investigation and prosecution of driving under the influence cases as

well as those involving homicides. Currently, we are able to download the majority of the registered vehicles on the roadway with modules produced between 2003 and 2025, but the technology is constantly changing. In order to access newer technology and expand the number of vehicles we are able to download, upgrades and additional stand-alone kids are required. This would allow the San Bernardino County District Attorney's office to continue to be a hub to assist all other agencies within our county and potentially outside our county as well. In order to better address the driving under the influence activity and the number of vehicular deaths that occur on our roadways and in our communities each year, the San Bernardino County District Attorney's Office proposes a team of 3 full time prosecutors. While the past year saw significant growth in our prosecutions and community outreach, there was little time for training. A third prosecutor would significantly improve the results of the unit, as well as allowing the attorneys to reach more of the OTS Goals of education, of themselves and throughout the community. The community events allow the victims effected by intoxication related collisions and the community at large that they are supported and that the San Bernadino County District Attorney's Office is working toward the goal of reducing intoxication related fatalities. In a community so large and spread so far two prosecutors can only do so much while ensuring the quality of their case loads and prosecutions. The addition of a third prosecutor would allow the team to meet more of their goals while relieving the strain of the workload. Even further, none of these cases would be possible without the Office's Victim Witness Advocates. We propose the

The primary program goal of the San Bernardino County District Attorney's Bureau of Victim Services is to provide mandatory services expeditiously to crime victims and their families to minimize the negative impact the crime has upon those involved. There is a disparity in the law between vehicular crimes and other serious crimes – no other serious crime involving a death is sentenced by a misdemeanor, or PC 4019 credits (half time), only vehicular crimes. Even further in a community of working-class families, that commute more than neighboring communities and Vehicular crimes are particularly difficult as the seriousness of the injury and/or death is not just an emotional loss, it is the loss of the head of household, the only source of income, and in almost a quarter of the population, the only parent in the household. The San Bernardino District Attorney Victim Advocates assist the victims and their families through the time of crisis. The Advocates assist our families pursue restitution, which might include losses incurred for funeral expenses, medical bills, lost wages, and emotional distress. The Advocates assist families apply for benefits through California Victim Compensation Board (Cal VCB). This program is crucial to families in our community because it provides funds often before traditional restitution. The Victim Advocates provide support through the legal process as well.

addition of a Victim Witness Advocate to the team.

The Victim Advocates provide Advocacy in the courtroom and through testimony. They prepare the family for what to expect in the courtroom, ensuring that the victims and families understand the rights that they have. If a victim's family member is called to testify, the advocate can help the prepare and go over ways to stay composed during testimony. The Advocate assists with Victim Impact Statements when it is time for sentencing and helps the family craft a statement that conveys the emotional, psychological, and financial impact of the victim's death. The Advocate further provides support during that sentencing ensuring the impact statements and the victims voices are heard.

The vehicular homicide prosecutors rely heavily on the Victim Advocates in each of their intoxication related fatality cases. These cases are emotionally charged, and the families are at a mental and emotional loss. The Advocate teams up with the vertically assigned attorney to further the goal of helping victims and ensuring justice. Yet, while both the prosecutor and advocate focus on that goal the Advocate frees the prosecutor to focus on the legal aspects of the case by providing the necessary, often weekly support to the victims. The addition of an Advocate to the OTS Grant would ensure a specialized advocate who is familiar with the particularities of vehicular crimes.

The San Bernardino County District Attorney's Office will continue to work towards the goals of eliminating traffic fatalities and injuries on California roadways through specialized and equitable prosecution of driving under the influence cases by vertically assigned prosecutors and a dedicated investigator. With the proposed expansion of the team of an additional prosecutor and much needed dedicated Victim Advocate we hope to expand our goals and our reach to ensure

that all members of the community have access to victim services and the justice system and the services necessary to rebuild, repair, and end intoxicated driving.

#### Agency Qualifications:

Current staffing for the Office of Traffic Safety Grant consists of two experienced prosecutors. The senior member of the team has been in the unit for over 3 years and has been an attorney for 10 years. Offenses she has prosecuted in trial include gross vehicular manslaughter, hit and run causing death, driving under the influence causing injury with great bodily injury, robbery, rape, burglary, narcotics trafficking, arson, assault with a deadly weapon, as well as driving under the influence cases. She is a P.O.S.T. certified instructor and teaches at both the basic academy and Advanced Officer Training. The second member of the team is a Deputy District Attorney who has been an attorney for almost 11 years. He has worked as a civil attorney defending personal injury cases including claims arising from vehicle collisions. He has significant criminal law experience involving cases which involved attempted murder, drugs, theft, domestic violence, vandalism, resisting arrest, driving under the influence, manslaughter, assault with a deadly weapon and murder. Additional attorney staff would allow additional cases to be prosecuted by specialized staff. Support staff also include and administrative supervisor who is involved I the grant as well as a dedicated grant investigator. This investigator was a police officer for 25 years, spending 6 of those years as a traffic/motor officer which included MAIT duties. He has attended basic, intermediate, and advanced collision courses, ARIDE, SFST courses and is a POST certified instructor. As an instructor he taught a Sheriff's Emergency Vehicle Operations Center (EVOC), he is The Office of Traffic Safety Grant Unit has also been provided the use of a dedicated paralegal who is shared with a General Homicide Deputy District Attorney. The office will continue to send the assigned prosecutors and investigator to ongoing trainings to keep them informed with the most current practice and developments in the prosecution of driving under the influence cases.

### Community Collaboration and Engagement

Also, our prosecutors will continue to take part in Every 15 minutes events put on by the local police agencies to interact with and teach young people the dangers of driving under the influences. It is anticipated that our prosecutors will create partnerships with local schools and youth programs to conduct presentations to students to educate them of the dangers of driving under the influence and the encourage safe options.

#### Phase 1 - Program Preparation:

- Recruit and hire all staff for the grant.
- Procure all materials necessary to implement the grant.
- Identify dates and schedule the four in person Roundtable Meetings (one each quarter with telephone or video conference capabilities). Notify the OTS coordinator of the dates. - f) Attend training programs that cover evaluation and preparation of DUI drug cases, marijuana, prescription drugs, drug trends, people's experts, defense challenges, cross-examination of experts, SFST evidence, jury considerations and toxicology evidence, and incorporate this information into DUI trainings for attorneys and law enforcement personnel.
