III. Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1990 – (Subrecipient Handbook, Section 2152)

The text of 28 C.F.R. Part 38 is available via the Electronic Code of Federal Regulations (currently accessible at https://www.ecfr.gov/cgi-bin/ECFR?page=browse), by browsing to Title 28-Judicial Administration, Chapter 1, Part 38, under e-CFR "current" data.

15. Restrictions on "Lobbying"

In general, as a matter of federal law, federal funds awarded by OJP may not be used by the Subrecipient, either directly or indirectly, to support or oppose the enactment, repeal, modification, or adoption of any law, regulation, or policy, at any level of government. Use of Subaward funds for construction of new facilities is restricted by statute. Any questions concerning this provision should be directed to the Cal OES Program Specialist prior to incurring the expense or commencing the activity in question.

Performance Measures

To ensure compliance with the Government Performance and Results Act (Pub. L. No. 103-62) and the GPRA Modernization Act of 2010 (Pub. L. No. 111-352), program performance under this Subaward is measured by the following:

- o Percent reduction in the average number of days from the submission of a sample to a forensic science laboratory to the delivery of test results to a requesting office or agency (calculated by reporting the average number of days to process a sample at the beginning of the grant period versus the average number of days to process a sample at the end of the grant period);
- Percent reduction in the number of backlogged forensic cases (calculated by reporting the number of backlogged forensic cases at the beginning of the grant period versus the number of backlogged forensic cases at the end of grant period), if applicable to the Subaward; and
- o The number of forensic science or medical examiner/coroner's office personnel who completed appropriate training or educational opportunities with these Coverdell funds, if applicable to the Subaward. Subrecipients are required to collect to the subaward.

22. The Subrecipient understands and agrees that gross income (revenues) from fees charged for forensic science or medical examiner services constitutes program income (in whole or in part), and that program income must be determined, used, and documented in accordance with the provisions of 2 C.F.R. 200.307, including as applied in the Department of Justice (DOJ) Grants Financial Guide, as it may be revised from time to time. The recipient further understands and agrees that both program income earned during the award period and expenditures of such program income must be reported on the quarterly and final Federal Financial Reports (SF 425) and are subject to audit.

The Subrecipient understands and agrees that program income earned during the award period may be expended only for permissible uses of funds specifically identified in the solicitation for the Paul Coverdell Forensic Science Improvement Grants Program. The recipient further understands and agrees that program income earned during the award period may not be used to supplant State or local government funds, but instead may be used only to increase the amount of funds that would, in the absence of Federal funds or program income, be available from State or local government sources for the permissible uses of funds listed in the solicitation.

The Subrecipient understands and agrees that program income that is earned during the final ninety (90) days of the award period may, if appropriate, be obligated (as well as expended) for permissible uses during the ninety-day (90-day) period following the end of the award period. The recipient further understands and agrees that any program income earned during the award period that is not obligated and expended within ninety (90) days of the end of the award period must be returned to OJP.

23. The Subrecipient acknowledges that, as stated in the solicitation for the Paul Coverdell Forensic Science Improvement Grants Program, NIJ assumes that Subrecipients of Coverdell funds will make use of the process referenced in their certification as to external investigations and will refer allegations of serious negligence or misconduct substantially affecting the integrity of forensic results to government entities with an appropriate process in place to conduct independent external investigations, such as the government entity (or entities) identified in the grant application. The recipient shall submit the following information as part of its final report: (1) the number and nature of any allegations of serious negligence or misconduct substantially affecting the integrity of forensic results received during the 12-month period of the award; (2) information on the referrals of such allegations (e.g., the government entity or entities to which referred, the date of referral); (3) the outcome of such referrals (if known as of the date of thereport); and (4) if any such allegations were not referred, the reason(s) for the non-referral. Should the project period for this award be extended, the recipient shall submit the above information as to the first twelve months of the award as part of the first semi-annual progress report that comes due after the conclusion of the first twelve months of the project period, and shall submit the required information as to subsequent twelve-month periods every twelve months

thereafter (as part of a semi-annual progress report) until the close of the award period, at which point the recipient shall submit the required information as to any period not covered by prior reports as part of its final report. The recipient understands and agrees that funds may be withheld (including funds under future awards), or other related requirements may be imposed, if the required information is not submitted on a timely basis.

- 24. To assist in information sharing, the award Subrecipient shall provide the Cal OES grant manager with a copy of publications (including those prepared for conferences and other presentations) resulting from this award, prior to or simultaneous with their public release. NIJ defines publications as any written, visual or sound material substantively based on the project, formally prepared by the award recipient for dissemination to the public. Submission of publications prior to or simultaneous with their public release aids NIJ in responding to any inquiries that may arise. Any publications - excluding press releases and newsletters - whether published at the recipient's or government's expense. shall contain the following statement: "This project was supported by Award No. , awarded by the National Institute of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, U.S. Department of Justice. The opinions, findings, and conclusions or recommendations expressed in this publication/program/exhibition are those of the author(s) and do not necessarily reflect those of the Department of Justice." This statement shall appear on the first page of written publications. For audio and video publications, it shall be included immediately after the title of the publication in the audio or video file.
- 25. The Subrecipient shall transmit to the Cal OES grant manager copies of all official award-related press releases at least ten (10) working days prior to public release. Advance notice permits time for coordination of release of information by Cal OES and NIJ where appropriate and to respond to press or public inquiries.
- 26. Copyright; Data Rights

The Subrecipient acknowledges that OJP reserves a royalty-free, non-exclusive, and irrevocable license to reproduce, publish, or otherwise use, and authorize others to use (in whole or in part, including in connection with derivative works), for Federal purposes: (1) any work subject to copyright developed under Subaward; and (2) any rights of copyright to which a Subrecipient purchases ownership with Federal support.

The Subrecipient acknowledges that OJP has the right to (1) obtain, reproduce, publish, or otherwise use the data first produced under a Subaward; and (2) authorize others to receive, reproduce, publish, or otherwise use such data for Federal purposes. "Data" includes data as defined in Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) provision 52.227-14 (Rights in Data - General).

It is the responsibility of the Subrecipient to ensure that this condition is included in any Subaward under this Subaward.

The Subrecipient has the responsibility to obtain from Subrecipients, contractors, and subcontractors (if any) all rights and data necessary to fulfill the Subrecipient's obligations to the Government under this Subaward. If a proposed Subrecipient, contractor, or subcontractor refuses to accept terms affording the Government such rights, the Subrecipient shall promptly bring such refusal to the attention of the Cal OES Program Specialist for the Subaward and not proceed with the agreement in question without further authorization from Cal OES.

27. The Subrecipient agrees to comply with all Federal, State, and local environmental laws and regulations applicable to the development and implementation of the activities to be funded under this Subaward.

Budget Narrative

General Training

Three Criminalists will attend the California Association of Criminalists (CAC) North meeting to be held in Santa Cruz, California in Spring 2020. Similarly, three Criminalists will attend the CAC South meeting to be held in Los Angeles, California in Fall 2020. These meetings, which are specific to issues encountered by Criminalists in California, also serve as an introduction of newer Criminalists to other practitioners in California with whom to network. Cost for the spring meeting including registration, travel, lodging and meals is estimated at \$7,053. Cost for the fall meeting including registration, lodging and meals is estimated at \$5,562.

Three Supervising Criminalists will attend the American Society of Crime Laboratory Directors meeting in Denver, Colorado in March of 2020. This is the largest annual meeting of crime lab directors in the country and provides detailed information on grants, pending legislation and other topics of interest to the forensic science community. Held in conjunction with this event is the annual meeting of the delegate assembly of the American Society of Crime Laboratory Directors/ Laboratory Accreditation Board where changes and modifications to the accreditation program are discussed and voted upon. Cost for this training, including registration, travel, lodging and meals is estimated at \$7,803.

Two Supervising Criminalists will attend the California Association of Crime Laboratory Directors meetings in the Spring and a Supervising Criminalist will attend in the Fall of 2020. This meeting provides information about proposed legislative changes that might impact the Laboratory, grant funding opportunities and restrictions, management and leadership training. It will also give management personnel the opportunity to network with supervisors and managers from other agencies. Cost for the spring meeting in northern California including registration, travel, lodging and meals is estimated at \$2,676. Cost for the fall meeting in southern California including registration, lodging and meals is estimated at \$952.

The Quality Assurance Officer will attend the annual training conference of the Association of Quality Assurance Managers in South Lake Tahoe, California in Fall of 2020. This meeting provides up to date information regarding proposed changes to laboratory accreditation programs, methods to insure the quality of the laboratory analysis process and various sources for required proficiency tests for laboratory analysts. Cost for this training, including registration, travel, lodging and meals is estimated at \$2,151.

Three laboratory staff members will attend the ANAB Forensic ISO/IEC 17025 Assessor Training in California. This training will provide them with a more in depth understanding of the accreditation requirements and allow them to conduct

assessments of other laboratories. Cost for this training, including registration, travel, lodging and meals is estimated at \$7,575.

Firearms Training

Two Firearms Examiners will attend the Annual Association of Firearm and Toolmark Examiners (AFTE) conference to be held in Nashville, TN in May 2020. This meeting provides information on accreditation issues, manufacturing updates, legislative initiatives and examination training. Cost for this training, including registration, travel, lodging and meals is estimated at \$6,146.

Four Examiners will attend a local armorer's course to obtain more in-depth information about the functioning of handguns, rifles and shotguns routinely encountered in case work. Cost for this training, including registration and meals is estimated at \$2,036.

One Criminalist will attend the Manufacturing Tours offered by the Advanced Firearms Consulting Group. These tours provide first-hand training of the manufacturing processes of various firearms and requires travel to three different manufacturing facilities on the east coast. Cost for this training, including registration, travel, lodging and meals is estimated at \$4,395.

Controlled Substances Training

Three criminalists will attend the Clandestine Laboratory Investigating Chemists Technical Training Seminar in Houston, TX in September of 2020. This training provides the most current information about national drug trends, legislative changes related to new and emerging drugs, analytical techniques for drug analysis and safety and synthesis information related to illicit drug labs. Cost for this training, including registration, travel, lodging and meals is estimated at \$7,209.

Crime Scene Investigation Training

The International Association for Identification is the leading forensic group for Crime Scene Investigation. Their International and State Division meetings provide state of the art training for crime scene investigators.

Two Sheriff's Crime Scene Specialists will attend the International Association for Identification International meeting in Orlando, FL in August 2020. Cost for this training, including registration, travel, lodging and meals is estimated at \$5,352. Two Sheriff's Crime Scene Specialists will attend the International Association for Identification California Division meeting in Rancho Mirage, CA in May 2020. Cost for this training, including registration, lodging and meals is estimated at \$2,540.

Three Sheriff's Crime Scene Specialists will attend the International Association for Identification Certification Test Preparation Course in Orange County, California

in September 2020. This course provides intensive training in preparing for the certification exam for crime scene investigators. At the end of the course, attendees take the certification exam. Cost for this training, including registration and meals is \$1,212.

Forensic Alcohol Training

One Criminalist will attend the annual meeting of the International Association for Chemical Testing in Tucson, AZ in 2020. This meeting provides valuable information regarding blood, breath and urine alcohol testing and interpretation for traffic-related purposes and covers basic alcohol chemistry, physiology, etc. Cost for this training, including registration, travel, lodging and meals is estimated at \$1,659.

Two Criminalists will attend the Borkenstein Alcohol School in December 2020. This school, held in Bloomington, Indiana is considered the "gold standard" for the training of alcohol analysts. Training includes the pharmacology of alcohol, impacts of alcohol on driving ability, breath testing methods, blood testing methods and courtroom presentation of evidence in driving under the influence of alcohol trials. Cost for this training, including registration, travel, lodging and meals is estimated at \$7,308.

A Criminalist will attend both semi-annual California of Toxicologists meetings. These meetings discuss changes in alcohol legislation, testing techniques and defense attacks on blood and breath alcohol tests. Cost for the spring meeting in San Francisco, Ca including registration, travel, lodging and meals is estimated at \$1,084. Cost for the fall meeting in Orange County, CA including registration, lodging and meals is estimated at \$552.

Project Narrative

Problem Statement

The San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department-Scientific Investigations Division (SBSD-SID) services over eighty local agencies and Sheriff's stations in San Bernardino County, California. The SBSD-SID is a forensic science laboratory accredited through ANAB / American Society of Crime Laboratory Directors/Laboratory Accreditation Board (ASCLD/LAB, certificate #ALI-409-T). The Crime Laboratory first attained the status under the legacy program in 1995 and renewed it every five years until 2016. In 2016, the Laboratory achieved accreditation under the ISO 17025 International Program. Among the many disciplines covered by the certificate are Firearms, Trace, Forensic Biology, Controlled Substance, Blood Alcohol, and Crime Scene Investigations (CSI).

The Scientific Investigations Division of the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department has a training budget as part of the overall operating costs of the laboratory operations. As the Laboratory's discretionary budget has decreased over the last five years, these funds are extremely limited and are applied primarily to a few in-state training opportunities. This grant will supplement our general forensic training and provide specific training in six areas: General Forensics, Firearms, Trace, Controlled Substance, Blood Alcohol, and Crime Scene Investigations. Information learned from these training classes will be disseminated at individual unit meetings.

Plan and Capabilities

The Crime Laboratory plans to utilize all 2019 Coverdell funding for training related expenses. Due to current budgetary conditions and the lack of currently available space for additional analysts, the only viable means of improving productivity and reducing case analysis backlogs is by enhancing the expertise of the current staff.

The SBSD-SID currently has three full-time Firearms Examiners, one Firearms Examiner Trainee and a Forensic Specialist who is assigned to the NIBIN program. Normally, twenty to thirty cases per month are submitted for bullet, fired cartridge case, firearm, and toolmark comparisons. Due to our limited staff size, we are unable to examine all requested firearms cases. We triage our cases through priority assessment by the Firearms Supervisor to maximize our effectiveness through a thorough and current understanding of the firearms and ammunition available, as well as the nuances associated with toolmark examinations.

The Firearms/Toolmarks Unit completed 133 firearms cases, 2 toolmark cases and 486 National Integrated Ballistic Identification Network (NIBIN) entry cases in 2018. Only cases with court dates, cases needing analysis for filing purposes, or high visibility cases are currently being assigned for analysis as priority one. These cases are handled as soon as possible. All other case requests are worked as time permits as priority two. As of November 19, 2019, the number of

backlogged priority one firearms cases was 4, the number of backlogged priority two firearms cases was 344, the number of backlogged priority one NIBIN cases was 11 and the number of backlogged priority two NIBIN cases was 383. The current average turnaround time for firearms cases is 14.6 days and for NIBIN cases is 44.1 days. The turnaround time is expected to significantly decrease as new examiners become qualified and a greater number of cases are analyzed. With the training provided, the goal of the unit will be to reduce the turnaround time to less than 60 days while maintaining a priority one backlog of less than 10 cases.

One of the foremost means of information exchange among firearms and toolmark examiners is participation in the annual Association of Firearm and Toolmark Examiners (AFTE) conference. The oral presentations at these meetings are complimented by the poster sessions, vendor displays, and the informative workshops. We intend to send two staff members to the AFTE meeting in May of 2020. The meeting will be held in Austin, TX.

Additionally, Firearms/Toolmarks Unit staff members will attend a local armorer's course to obtain in depth information about the functioning of specific weapons.

The SBSD-SID has one full-time Trace Examiner. The Examiner is proficient in gunshot residue analysis, fire debris analysis, shoe/tire impression comparison, chemical unknown analysis and fracture match determination. The Trace Unit

completed 163 cases with a turnaround time of 37.4 days in 2018. As of November 18, 2019, the number of backlogged cases was 27 cases. The current average turnaround time is 19.5 days.

The SBSD-SID has one Sheriff's Supervising Crime Scene Specialist, two Sheriff's Lead Crime Scene Specialist and seven Sheriff's Crime Scene Specialists who respond to crime scenes. The Crime Scene Investigations (CSI) Unit processed over 245 crime scenes with a turnaround time for the completion of crime scene reports of 41.7 days in 2018. Once the crime scene is completed, personnel must complete latent print processing and swabbing for DNA evidence on collected items. Sheriff's Crime Scene Specialists complete crime scene, autopsy, photography and technical processing reports. As of November 18, 2019, the backlog of CSI crime scene reports was 35. The current average turnaround time for the completion of crime scene reports is 32 days. To facilitate the investigation and prosecution of crimes related to these scenes, it is essential that the turnaround time be kept to less than 30 days in all cases and average maintained at less than 21 days.

Crime scene investigation techniques learned from the International Association for Identification (IAI) conference will augment the experience level of current Sheriff's Crime Scene Specialists and greatly expedite the training of our new Sheriff's Crime Scene Specialists to improve the quality of their work, thereby,

reducing backlogs. With this acquired training, time spent related to crime scene documentation and reporting should also decrease.

Quality of our crime scene processing is always a priority. The information gained by the two Sheriff's Crime Scene Specialists attending the IAI International Meeting in Orlando, FL in August 2020 and the two Sheriff's Crime Scene Specialists attending the California Division of the IAI meeting in Rancho Mirage, CA in April 2020 will significantly increase the quality of work we do at crime scenes. This newly-acquired knowledge will be another tool that can be used to solve cases in the County. Three Sheriff's Crime Scene Specialists will attend the International Association for Identification Certification Test Preparation course in Orange County, CA. At the end of the course, the attendees will take the certification exam for crime scene investigations.

The Controlled Substances Unit completed 11,315 controlled substance cases with an average turnaround time of 17.3 days in 2018. The Controlled Substances Unit classifies a case as "backlog" when it is not completed within ten days of submission. As of November 18, 2019, the number of controlled substances backlogged cases was 619. The current average turnaround time is 12 days. The goal will be to maintain the turnaround time at less than 10 days and to reduce the number of backlogged cases by improving productivity and training additional staff members in drug analysis.

Three Controlled Substances staff members will attend the Clandestine Laboratory Investigating Chemists meeting in Houston, TX in September 2020. This training provides up-to-date information about drug trends, illicit manufacturing, analytical techniques and changes to controlled substances laws. This is the premier continuing educational opportunity for drug chemists.

The Blood Alcohol Section has one full-time analyst and one- part-time analyst. The Blood Alcohol Section completed 4,724 cases with a turnaround time of 14 days in 2018. As of November 18, 2019, the number of backlogged cases was 434. The current average turnaround time is 12 days. The goal for this unit will be to maintain the turnaround time at less than 10 days.

Two Forensic Alcohol staff member will attend the Borkenstein Alcohol Course in December 2020. This is the premier course for the training of alcohol analysts. Staff members will also attend the International Association for Chemical Testing meeting in Tucson, AZ in April 2020 and both the spring and fall meetings of the California Association of Toxicologists.

General criminalistics training will be included in the program by attendance at several professional meetings. Three staff members will attend the spring 2020 seminar of the California Association of Criminalists (CAC) in San Francisco, CA. Three staff members will attend the CAC fall 2020 seminar in Los Angeles, CA.

The Quality Assurance Officer will attend the Association of Forensic Quality Assurance Managers meeting in South Lake Tahoe, CA in October 2020.

Three Supervising Criminalists will attend the American Society of Crime Laboratory Directors meeting in Denver, CO in March 2020 and both the spring and fall meetings of the California Association of Crime Laboratory Directors.

Additionally, three staff members will attend the ANAB Forensic ISO/IEC 17025 Technical Assessor Training at a California location to be announced.






