They are the symbol of this great country, they have feelings, emotions, raise babies, feed their young, so they can thrive. That statement could be true, but I don't think folks realize for the people in Southern California how special it is to have a magnificent pair of bald eagles call this beautiful place home. There are not many nesting Bald Eagles in So. California or even places/environment for bald eagles to build a nest and survive in. So this nest is very special to the people locally and many around the world that enjoy their day to day interactions. Jackie and Shadow are a very special couple and they show us this all the time. The wildlife who call it home, the ecosystem, and especially Big Bear Lake, which is Jackie & Shadow's main source of food for themselves, as well as their chicks, would, without a doubt, abandon this nest. The hustle and bustle of new construction of the magnitude that the Moon Camp would cause would be detrimental to our eagles. It would be utterly devasting. When BBL opened up this spring to resident's only, there were a few boats on the lake and the eagles were fearful as fishing in the lake was much more difficult because of the intrusion into their feeding source. Eagles are an amazing bird of prey. The best, actually. They are the rulers of the sky. They, however, are fearful of other "prey", like bulldozers, a multitude of additional traffic, construction workers, and the like. This is most prevalent when chicks are in the nest. The chicks are unable to fend for themselves and are actually prey for other predators. When chicks are in the nest, either Jackie or Shadow are in the nest at all times. The nest is never left empty when eggs/chicks are there. Unfortunately, Jackie always gets night duty and is incredible at protecting her chicks. Eagles sleep with only half of their brain and it is an incredible brain. One eye is always open to discourage night nest captures. The love and dedication by both eagles is an awesome sight to behold. The love, concern, fear, and arduous protection is, once you've witnessed it, is so very hard to forget.

I lived the first 62 years of my life in Southern California. I also have witnessed destructive wildfires my entire life. So sad for the human victims of the fires, as well as all the animals and birds who lose their lives. My family owned a cabins in Big Bear, Lake Arrowhead, and Rimforest. I spent many wonderful days of my life in the mountains. The residents of Big Bear/Fawnskin could also be in danger from this development.

I have just one closing comment. There is a writer for the Los Angeles Times who wrote an article entitled, "How Watching An Eagle's Nest Saved My Life" shortly after Covid-19 hit and everyone was quarantined. The writer went on to say that he watched a mother hummingbird and her chicks in his flower box under one of his windows. He described it as so calming and peaceful. When the chicks left the nest, he was so saddened. Then he found out about an amazing bald eagle nest in Big Bear. He went on to describe in detail how grateful he was that he found the eagle's nest and watched ardently for weeks and weeks. He said that watching the amazing Jackie and Shadow took him to a better place and that he was so comforted by their interactions with each other. His entire outlook on life had changed now knowing that life does go on and he was so fortunate that Jackie and Shadow came into his life. I saved the article for quite some time. I read it, cried, read it again, and realized how blessed I was that eagle lovers everywhere had Jackie and Shadow. Please allow this to continue.

I hope that this email finds you all well.

The Moon Camp development is in up for review again on July 28th. I was associated with this matter in the fall of 2019 as an intended speaker and will be set to speak at this hearing too.

There are many reasons why this being on the table again came as a surprise that this is being reviewed during our pandemic. It was unsuitable last time, but in the season that the world finds itself in makes it all the more unsuitable. A pandemic clearly is not the best time to future plans to deforestize.

My connecting with you this day is critical, The gem that Big Bear has extended through generations, and will for generations to come is an irreplaceable ecosystem that is both unique and wonderful.

The current zoning restrictions (rural) only allow them to build 1 1/2 houses on that parcel. Now, they want to push zoning changes to residential, which will allow them to build more than 50 houses. The developer is finding "overriding circumstances", i.e. need for housing (in this case, luxury housing) and refuses to admit any impacts ("direct or indirect") on the nesting eagles, and the surrounding ecosystem.

There are presently 400+ homes for sale in the area, and would be further impacted if additional homes are built. The area that you all are fully aware is already in the top 1% of fire hazard areas. This is not only bad stewardship, but extremely irresponsible and dangerous.

It is a powerful educational tool, helping teachers in classrooms worldwide to educate and inspire future generations. With this attention and exposure it not only serves us as nature's precious gift, but will drive interest and tourism for today, tomorrow and future generations.

I appeal to your hearts today. Do we continue to cherish short-sighted gains by laying barren what has been gifted that cannot be replaced, or in this time that all appears to be crashing around us in our world stand up in support of humanity, and steward what is now scarce and precious for our children, and their children's children?

Big Bear is a rural community that has always been a rural zone of 1 house per 40 acres. It already has only 3 ways in & out and is on California's list of cities with the worst fire evacuation routes. The traffic is already an issue with the tourists that frequent this natural resort that offers so much beauty.

I am requesting that you do not support and deny the request for approval of the proposed Moon Camp Development Project in Fawnskin. While the County covets the tax revenue, this project is detrimental to the public interest.

- o Currently this site is designated as rural and surrounded by National Forest and Big Bear Lake. As noted, it requires a zone change that would increase population density. This threatens the local environment with higher levels of pollution, loss of habitat and stress on water.
- Big Bear/Lake Arrowhead is rated a high-risk fire area. The area is considered most hazardous relative to Fire and Emergency Evacuation Routes. It is ranked in the top 1% in the State. Many insurance companies are denying insurance coverage where wildfires are prevalent and evacuation routes are compromised.
- The site would be built on land that is approx. ½ mile adjacent to a Bald Eagle's nest; birds consistently present since 2012. The United States Department of Agriculture/Forest Service protects the Bald Eagle in Big Bear. Their website reviews the importance of feeding in shallow waters especially in the winter months to survive. The Moon Camp project is exactly where they forage. The EIR 2010/2011 noted significant adverse impact to Bald Eagles.
- Significant and biodiverse flora would be destroyed with the approval of this project. It appears in the submitted paperwork that only 1/3 would be uninterrupted. There is no recovery from the annihilation of plants and habitat.

While the State remarks that wildlife will be monitored, once the homes and the marina are built, there is a point of no return. I am appealing to you; please reject the approval of the Moon Camp Project.

Dear Supervisors:

I am asking you to DENY the detrimental zone change and project proposal for the Moon Camp development in Fawnskin. Increasing housing density in this area would cause major irreversible harm to the bald eagles that nest nearby and forage on the site.

The most recent Draft Environmental Impact Report (2011) concluded there would be significant adverse impacts to bald eagles. That analysis was based on bald eagles only wintering in the valley for a few months a year. Beginning in 2012, a pair of bald eagles began nesting within ½ mile of the project site. The much more significant impacts this project would cause based on this key change has never been evaluated. Project proponents have attempted to conceal the true impacts to bald eagles by creating what they call a 'Long Term Management Plan.' Without proper analysis, any management plan is invalid.

Planning staff cites the need for housing as more important than any harm caused to bald eagles. This area is in the heart of a National Forest, in a unique, rural area on the north side of the lake. The project site itself contains 3 species of plants and rare habitat that do not exist anywhere else in the world! Less than 1/3 of this special habitat is planned to be conserved. With over 600 homes currently for sale in this small valley (150 more than a year ago), there is no justification to declare that a need for housing overrides significant harmful impacts to bald eagles.

Any zone change, as this project requires, must be in the public interest. This area is already rated such a high fire risk that many local homeowners have had their insurance cancelled. A housing density increase along the National Forest boundary would escalate the fire risk. The area is already ranked in the top 1% as having the most hazardous, least adequate fire and emergency evacuation routes in the state. This zoning change would further aggravate that potentially dire evacuation deficiency.

To approve this project, County decision-makers would be saying they care more about adding luxury houses and a private marina than they care about preventing harmful impacts to the bald eagles, to our National Forest, to our residents and to our visitors. Please DENY the detrimental zone change and project proposal for the Moon Camp development in Fawnskin.





I hope that this email finds you all well.

The Moon Camp development is in up for review again on July 28th. I was associated with this matter in the fall of 2019 as an intended speaker and will be set to speak at this hearing too.

There are many reasons why this being on the table again came as a surprise that this is being reviewed during our pandemic. It was unsuitable last time, but in the season that the world finds itself in makes it all the more unsuitable. A pandemic clearly is not the best time to future plans to deforestize.

My connecting with you this day is critical, The gem that Big Bear has extended through generations, and will for generations to come is an irreplaceable ecosystem that is both unique and wonderful.

The current zoning restrictions (rural) only allow them to build 1 1/2 houses on that parcel. Now, they want to push zoning changes to residential, which will allow them to build more than 50 houses. The developer is finding "overriding circumstances", i.e. need for housing (in this case, luxury housing) and refuses to admit any impacts ("direct or indirect") on the nesting eagles, and the surrounding ecosystem.

The intended building development is only one half mile from a Bald Eagle nest and could eliminate the possibility of the eagles continuing to nest there. Their shoreline habitat and nesting neighborhood could be destroyed to the point that they abandon their nest and leave the area. The nest cam with over 13 Million views, is known worldwide. It is a powerful educational tool, helping teachers in classrooms worldwide to educate and inspire future generations. With this attention and exposure it not only serves us as nature's precious gift, but will drive interest and tourism for today, tomorrow and future generations.

I appeal to your hearts today. The development would scare them away, and for anyone who has watched their beautiful and intelligent lives via this camera, that would be utterly heartbreaking. Regarding the Moon Camp development project, RCK Properties originally acquired this parcel of land on Big Bear Lake under the zoning approval for rural homes with a minimum lot size of 40 acres. Now, they want the County to approve a re-zoning, which would allow them to construct 50 large luxury homes, plus a massive marina, plus a large marina parking lot. This request for re-zoning is being made under the claim of providing additional necessary housing. However; these homes will not be for local residents who need to live near their place of employment within the Big Bear community - these will be large, luxury vacation homes - not necessary housing.

The influx of additional housing from the Moon Camp development will stress the already fragile eco-system of the Big Bear Valley, including the local water wells, which sometimes run dry even under existing customer demand. The additional housing, human population, noise and traffic will also strain and/or cause irreversible damage to the eco-system of the local flora and fauna around Big Bear Lake, as well as within the bordering San Bernardino National Forest. Many of America's national forests and grasslands - collectively called the National Forest System - face increased risks and alterations from escalating housing development on private rural lands along their boundaries. Unique creatures, such as the San Bernardino Flying Squirrel and the California Mountain Quail, will suffer potentially irreversible damage to their habitats and populations. And the nesting pair of American Bald Eagles on Big Bear Lake are not only protected as our National Bird, but they are also declared as an endangered species within the state of California, and so they deserve our utmost consideration and protection. That consideration and protection extends far beyond the actual nest site: Bald Eagles need peace and quiet for a successful nest site, they also need to forage in the surrounding area, and primarily within about one mile of the nest location while there are eaglets to be fed. The Moon Camp development site will increase the human population, noise levels and traffic within half a mile of this Bald Eagle nest, and the proposed marina will decimate a large portion of the Eagle's foraging territory. As this particular nest is located at the highest elevation of any other known Bald Eagle nest within the entire United States of America, they present the very unique opportunity to study these Eagles in detail. It could be possible that information gathered from this study could potentially prove to be invaluable to help protect and preserve the future success of these magnificent creatures. The Moon Camp development will disrupt this bonded pair and will cause them to abandon this nesting site, and will also very likely drive all of the Bald Eagles away from Big Bear Lake.

Local governments are required by Federal Law to acquire an Environmental Impact Report (EIP) before approving any development or construction project. An EIR must be prepared if there is substantial evidence that the project may have a significant effect on the environment. The 2011 EIP reported that additional construction in this area would have a negative impact on any Bald Eagles, and that was prior to any Bald Eagles living in Big Bear year-round, and also prior to a bonded pair of Bald Eagles actually nesting here. There would definitely be even more significant impact on the Bald Eagles currently.

Additional development within the Big Bear Valley will also stress other environmental concerns, such as air quality and water supply. Over development/over population of fragile mountain eco-systems simply invites the same air quality results as are currently evident in places such as Yosemite, Joshua Tree and Salt Lake Valley. And the available water supply in this area is already strained with water wells sometimes running dry even under existing customer demands. And, water availability also brings up the concern for fire safety in a forest setting. Given that this is a mountainous area, outside assistance may be unavailable or too slow in responding, which puts an even greater burden on local fire departments, who would be dealing with an already overburdened water supply.

The San Bernardino Mountains have been uplifted quite recently in geologic time, and they appear to continue to shift even today. Located along one of the most active tectonic boundaries on the globe, the San Andreas fault, the Big Bear area and the southern California region are susceptible to a wide range of hazards associated with geotechnical conditions. And the San Gorgonio-Banning fault system is located 19 miles south of the city of Big Bear Lake. The June 28, 1992 earthquake in the Big Bear Valley was registered as a magnitude 6.4. This earthquake occurred on an unnamed fault. The horizontal ground acceleration from this earthquake was far greater than what could have been expected from a named fault, indicating that these undiscovered and/or unnamed faults may pose an even greater threat to the Big Bear Community than those which are named and clearly mapped. Dear Mr. Nievez:

You may be wondering why people from all over the country, and probably farther, are against this development? It is simple, because your proposal and development could destroy what you currently have, which is a unique area of land. As it stands today, this area has a far greater impact and influence on the environment, and world, than what that project would contribute. How does it have world impact? You have an area that supports something no other place has, at least three plant species unique to Big Bear. You want to eradicate at least three plant species that exist no where else in the world. Let me remind you, once you eliminate a species, you cannot get it back. It's a mistake that cannot be undone. You also want to risk the treasure that has only recently come back to reside there, the American Bald eagle.

Why should this matter to you? There are several reasons. In the big picture, you are thinking too small. Your development jeopardizes the very thing that makes Big Bear Valley the attraction that it is, a unique geographical and environmental resource. If you ultimately destroy or eradicate the very thing people enjoy about the area, then eventually the draw to the area will be gone or diminished. At the same time, your proposal puts the residents and visitors, and any new residents and visitors, in danger. The area cannot support the development from a safety stand point. A fire risk is real. Unfortunately, the

devastation from fire may only be felt and taken seriously after a tragedy happens. You can prevent this risk from skyrocketing. You can prevent an ultimate tragedy. Why are you endangering the very people and wildlife that have made this area what it is? That seems very shortsighted, as well as disrespectful to what has given the area it's draw and magic in the first place.

Ask yourselves, who or what benefits from this development? If it's only the developer, then is it right to put an immediate financial gain, above the overall benefit of the current and long time residents, not to mention the wildlife, that calls that area home?

Anyone part of the decision approving this development project could be creating their own legacy of shame, which if approved, may follow you for the rest of your lives. Over time, do you want to be remembered for a bad decision that carries consequences that cannot be reversed? This is not something that is as simple as "oops, we were wrong." You are creating a situation and making a decision that your children and grandchildren, etc., will bear the burden of, not the glory. There is no glory in destruction for the sake of "progress" or short term financial gain. Progress for the sake of progress often has devastating consequences. Would you rather be remembered as the saviors of a rare treasure, or the contributors of the biggest mistake that area has ever seen? The legacy of this decision is in your hands.

Also ask yourselves, is this really what your residents want? I think your answer there is obvious, no. Decisions to approve a development against the people who made the area what it is are often viewed as tyrannical. Just because you can do something, doesn't mean you should.

The return of the Bald eagle has, in its short time period, probably done more for promoting the unique pristine appeal of Big Bear than this new development can ever accomplish. Their return has been organic, because the area supports this type of wildlife. Do one small survey, ask the Fawnskin proprietors about the increase in visitors they have experienced. They haven't been coming for a "luxury private development." Visitors are increasing because of the Bald Eagle, and the surrounding beauty of the area. No one travels to see "luxury homes and/or marinas." Quite frankly, you can get those anywhere. People come for the charm and nature experiences that they can't get anywhere else. Take away what is special and unique about Big Bear Valley, and you have just another ordinary area. But, you are potentially driving the future of increasing visitors that the return of the Bald Eagle has brought.

I was never aware of Big Bear until I started following your Bald eagles there. Because of them, I discovered the area that can best be described as a rare gem in a world of common rocks. Now, I plan to visit and make it a regular vacation destination. That is happening exponentially as your Bald eagle presence is reaching world viewing. Nature did that. The foresight to help the Bald eagles by respectfully putting in a cam for the word to view has done that. NOT a luxury home site and marina.

This is much longer than I had planned on writing, and honestly I could keep going with more reasons to disapprove this development. Please read the attached letter produced by your own residents. That should tell you something. In the end, it's a simple matter of doing the right thing for your residents, the wildlife, and yes, ultimately the world. It's a big responsibility you currently have, with what you may think is so far, a simple decision and not that far reaching. Dear County Planning Director, Heidi Duron,

I am requesting that you do not support and deny the request for approval of the proposed Moon Camp Development Project in Fawnskin. While the County covets the tax revenue, this project is detrimental to the public interest.

- Currently this site is designated as rural and surrounded by National Forest and Big Bear Lake. As noted, it requires a zone change that would increase population density. This threatens the local environment with higher levels of pollution, loss of habitat and stress on water.
- Big Bear/Lake Arrowhead is rated a high-risk fire area. The area is considered most hazardous relative to Fire
 and Emergency Evacuation Routes. It is ranked in the top 1% in the State. Many insurance companies are
 denying insurance coverage where wildfires are prevalent and evacuation routes are compromised.
- The site would be built on land that is approx. ½ mile adjacent to a Bald Eagle's nest; birds consistently present since 2012. The United States Department of Agriculture/Forest Service protects the Bald Eagle in Big Bear. Their website reviews the importance of feeding in shallow waters especially in the winter months to survive. The Moon Camp project is exactly where they forage. The EIR 2010/2011 noted significant adverse impact to Bald Eagles.
- Significant and biodiverse flora would be destroyed with the approval of this project. It appears in the submitted paperwork that only 1/3 would be uninterrupted. There is no recovery from the annihilation of plants and habitat.

While the State remarks that wildlife will be monitored, once the homes and the marina are built, there is a point of no return. I am appealing to you; please reject the approval of the Moon Camp Project.
