Services include the distribution of food, clothing, hygiene items, diapers, pet food, and other essential supplies through regularly scheduled in-person service days. The program operates year-round and prioritizes seniors, veterans, families, and individuals experiencing financial hardship. The project includes ADA accessibility upgrades, restroom and flooring improvements, enhanced lighting, kitchen and hygiene facilities, and the creation of a senior technology and safety lab. These improvements will support daily meal service, wellness programming, and safe community access. Services include the distribution of shelf-stable food items, hygiene supplies, diapers, baby food, and limited clothing and school supplies. Clients may receive assistance up to twice per month, with delivery available for individuals with disabilities. Services include safety planning, housing stabilization support, referrals to counseling and peer support, assistance with restraining orders and court accompaniment, and connections to essential resources such as utility assistance, transportation, and job readiness services. Services are delivered through individualized case management throughout the program year. The project includes the installation of a switchback pathway designed to meet ADA standards and Public Right-of-Way Accessibility Guidelines, providing a safe and accessible route for individuals with disabilities, seniors, youth, and other park users. This public facility improvement will remove physical barriers and improve equitable access to recreational amenities within a designated low- and moderate-income service area. Services are delivered throughout the program year and are designed to address academic, social, and family-level barriers to student success. Services include the distribution of non-perishable food, clothing, hygiene items, transportation vouchers, and limited emergency assistance through regularly scheduled weekly outreach stops in high-need locations. The program is designed to reach individuals and families who may not access traditional service sites by delivering assistance directly within the community. The improvements will address aging infrastructure to ensure a safe, energy-efficient, and code-compliant environment that supports year-round youth development, fitness, mentoring, and wellness programs. This public facility improvement will directly benefit low- and moderate-income youth and families who rely on the facility for after-school, mentoring, and community wellness services. The program operates citywide throughout the program year and prioritizes households facing immediate basic needs or housing crises. The project will reconstruct approximately 30,425 square feet of alley pavement to improve surface conditions, drainage, and safe access for residents, service vehicles, and emergency response. These infrastructure improvements will enhance neighborhood safety and mobility within identified low- and moderate-income service areas. The project includes pavement rehabilitation, curb ramp upgrades, and enhanced crosswalk improvements near a local school to improve safety, accessibility, and neighborhood mobility. These infrastructure improvements will benefit residents and pedestrians within the surrounding low- and moderate-income service area. Services are provided on a daily, weekly, and monthly basis and are designed to promote independence, reduce isolation, and improve quality of life for older adults. Services include one-on-one tutoring, small group literacy instruction, and basic computer and internet skills classes designed to improve reading, writing, and digital proficiency needed for employment, civic participation, and daily living. Services are delivered through weekly, in-person sessions at the Loma Linda Branch Library throughout the program year. Improvements will focus on locations where public safety concerns and accessibility barriers are present and will provide ADA-compliant pedestrian routes for seniors, and persons with disabilities. These infrastructure improvements will enhance ADA pedestrian access to essential services and public facilities within areas of the city. The program focuses on residential neighborhoods and addresses blighted and unsafe conditions through inspections, compliance assistance, and corrective actions intended to prevent neighborhood deterioration. CDBG funds will be used to support code enforcement personnel costs necessary to maintain effective service coverage within low- and moderate-income areas. Services include individualized case management, emergency rental and move-in assistance, motel vouchers for households experiencing homelessness, and distribution of surplus food boxes providing up to seven days of groceries for a family of four. The program prioritizes families with children, seniors, persons with disabilities, and individuals facing temporary financial crises and housing instability. Services are delivered on an as-needed basis throughout the program year. Services include 24-hour crisis response and hospital accompaniment, safety planning and crisis counseling, court and legal advocacy, case management, and referrals to housing, medical, and counseling resources. Services are provided on an ongoing, as-needed basis throughout the program year and are designed to promote safety, stability, and recovery for survivors. Services include assistance with family law, housing and landlord-tenant issues, child support, guardianship, conservatorship, and other civil matters, delivered through in-person, phone, and virtual consultations. The program is designed to support individuals who do not qualify for federally funded legal services and cannot afford private legal representation. CDBG funds will support staff wages necessary to operate the program.
