ORDINANCE NO.

An ordinance of San Bernardino County, State of California, to amend Chapters 1, 2, and 12 of Division 2 of Title 3 of the San Bernardino County Code relating to existing laws concerning control, impoundment, and abandonment of cats necessary to implement a Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate-Return program.

The Board of Supervisors of the County of San Bernardino, State of California, ordains as follows:

SECTION 1. The Board of Supervisors of San Bernardino County finds that:

- (a) San Bernardino County animal shelters take in more than 3,300 cats annually. Of these cats, approximately 1,300 are healthy Community Cats.
- (b) Community Cats are described as free-roaming cats who may be cared for by residents of the immediate area, and may consist of a mixture of feral cats, semi-socialized cats, and occasionally abandoned pets. One unspayed female cat can have approximately 3 litters of kittens each year. When these cats are spayed/neutered and vaccinated, it improves their health by reducing unwanted litters, fighting, and the incidence of disease.
- (c) San Bernardino County does not have a program to address Community Cats.
- (d) The most humane way to address Community Cats is by establishing a Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate_Return (TNVR) program where healthy, adult Ceommunity Ceats may be trapped, sterilized, ear-tipped, vaccinated and returned to their community by members individuals of the public and San Bernardino County Animal Care employees.
- (e) Adopting a TNVR Program will improve the health and well-being of Community Cats, reduce the number of healthy Community Cats coming into the County shelters, and reduce the number of healthy adult cats being euthanized in County shelters.

- (f) Revisions to the San Bernardino County Code are necessary because, as currently written, it is ambiguous if an individual, rescue group, or Animal Care employees that returns a Community Cat to the outside area where it was originally collected at would be in violation of the County's laws concerning control and abandonment of animals.
- (g) The proposed ordinance would amend the County Code for the purpose of regulating how Community Cats are to be controlled and <u>define</u> when it is permissible to release them into the outside environment <u>where</u> they have already been living.

SECTION 2. Section 32.0101 of Chapter 1 of Division 2 of Title 3 of the San Bernardino County Code is amended to read:

32.0101 Definitions.

For the purposes of this Chapter, the following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning.

ABANDONED ANIMAL. Any animal left unattended for a minimum of 24 hours without receiving proper care and/or treatment by its owner or caretaker. Community Cats returned to their original point of pick-up following treatment in a Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate-Return program shall not be considered abandoned when returned and released at or near the original point of pick-up as part of a community cat management program.

ALTERED DOG. Any dog which has been certified in writing by a veterinarian as being nonreproductive.

ANIMAL. Any mammal, poultry, fowl, reptile, fish, or any other living creature.

ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER. Any person duly appointed by the Health Officer and authorized to act on his or her behalf in the enforcement of the Animal Care and Control Program.

ANIMAL MENAGERIE. Any place where wild animals are kept or maintained for private or commercial purposes, including places where wild animals are boarded, trained, or kept for hire.

ANIMAL SHELTER. All places where impounded animals are to be confined,

whether by the County or by a private person or persons under contract or agreement with the County.

CAT. All domesticated felines <u>belonging to the genus Felis catus</u>. Cats shall be exempt from the stray animal and running at large provisions of Sections 32.0102 and 32.0108.

CHIEF OFFICER. The San Bernardino County Public Health Program Manager assigned to the Animal Care and Control program or any other person so designated.

COMMUNITY CAT. Community cat shall mean any free-roaming, unowned cat living in an outdoor environment that may or may not be a part of a cat colony. A community cat may or may not be feral.

<u>DEPARTMENT. Department means the San Bernardino County Department of Public Health.</u>

DOG. Any dog of any age, female or male.

EAR-TIPPING. The removal of the distal one-quarter of a Community Cat's left ear, which is approximately 3/8-inch, or 1 cm, in an adult and proportionally smaller in a kitten. This procedure is performed under sterile conditions while the Cat is under anesthesia, in compliance with any applicable federal or state law, and under the supervision of a licensed veterinarian. Ear-tips are designed to identify a Community Cat as being sterilized and lawfully vaccinated for rabies.

ENCLOSURE. A pen or structure suitable to confine an animal determined potentially dangerous or vicious. The ENCLOSURE shall be designed to prevent the animal from escaping and to prevent the entry of young children and other persons.

GUARD DOG. Any dog used for the purpose of guard duty.

HEALTH OFFICER. The San Bernardino County Health Officer or any other person duly authorized to act on his or her behalf.

IMPOUNDMENT. The picking up of an animal by a duly authorized person and bringing it into an animal shelter for confinement, custody, and disposition.

LEASH. Any rope, leather strap, chain or other material not exceeding six feet in

length being held in the hand of a person capable of controlling the animal to which it is attached.

LICENSE TAG. A piece of metal or other durable material inscribed with a date and number which has been issued by the County or a municipal dog licensing agency.

LIVESTOCK. All domesticated bovine, equine, caprine, ovine and porcine species.

OWNER or KEEPER. Any person who owns or maintains an animal, or who harbors or keeps an animal for 15 or more consecutive days, except a veterinarian or an operator of a grooming shop, a kennel or a pet shop engaged in the regular practice of this business.

PERIMETER FENCE. A fence which shall guard and contain the enclosure and shall be totally separate from such enclosure and shall be a minimum of six feet in height and shall be at least six feet from the enclosure on all sides to prevent contact between the animal and the public.

PERSON. Any person, firm, partnership, corporation, trust, or any association of persons.

POTENTIALLY DANGEROUS ANIMAL. Any of the following:

- (1) Any animal which, unprovoked, on two separate occasions within any 36-month period, engages in any behavior that requires defensive action by any person to prevent bodily injury, but only if the person and the animal are off the property of the owner or keeper of the animal when the animal behavior occurs;
- (2) Any animal, which, unprovoked, bites a person causing a less than severe injury, as defined below in this Subdivision;
- (3) Any animal, which, unprovoked, kills, seriously bites or otherwise inflicts or causes injury to a domestic animal, but only if such occurs off the property of the owner or keeper of the attacking animal.

REGISTRATION. Any animal which has been declared potentially dangerous or vicious shall be registered as such with the Animal Care and Control Program.

SEVERE INJURY. Any physical injury to a human being, which results in muscle

tears or disfiguring lacerations or which requires multiple sutures or corrective or cosmetic surgery.

SHELTERKEEPER. The San Bernardino County Public Health Animal Shelter Supervisor assigned to the Animal Care and Control program or any other person so designated by the Health Officer.

STRAY. Any animal, excluding Community Cats, with no identification or with no known owner or keeper.

TRAP-NEUTER-VACCINATE-RETURN (TNVR). A program whereby a Community Cat is trapped, or otherwise obtained, and provided rabies vaccination, sterilized, ear-tipped, and returned and released at the point of pickup following a determination that the Community Cat is healthy and capable of living independently.

UNLICENSED DOG. Any dog for which a current license has not been paid, or to which the current tag provided for in this Code is not attached.

VICIOUS ANIMAL. Any of the following:

- (1) Any animal seized under Penal Code <u>§section</u> 599aa (fighting animals) and fighting dogs as provided in Subdivision (a) of Penal Code <u>§section</u> 597.5 when there has been a conviction of the owner or keeper of the subject dogs under that subdivision of the Penal Code;
- (2) Any animal which, unprovoked, inflicts severe injury on a human being, as such injury is defined above in this Subdivision, or kills a human being;
- (3) Any animal previously determined and currently listed as a potentially dangerous animal, which, after its owner or keeper has been notified of this determination, continues the behavior described in the definition of POTENTIALLY DANGEROUS ANIMAL above or is maintained in violation of §section 32.1405 of this Code.

WILD ANIMAL. Any wild, exotic, dangerous or venomous animal, including but not limited to mammals, fowl, fish, or reptile.

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27 28 Bernardino County Code is added to read:

SECTION 3. Subsection 32.0103(e) of Chapter 1 of Division 2 of Title 3 of the San

32.0103 **Disposition of Impounded Animals.**

(e) For Community Cats that have been impounded, upon determination that the Community Cat is healthy, it shall be sterilized, vaccinated for rabies, have its eartipped, and then returned and released at or near the original point of pick-up.

SECTION 4. Section 32.0107 of Chapter 1 of Division 2 of Title 3 of the San Bernardino County Code is amended to read:

32.0107 **Abandoned Animals.**

It shall be unlawful to abandon any animal in the County of San Bernardino County. Community Cats shall not be considered abandoned when returned and released at or near the original point of pick-up as part of a Ceommunity Ceat management program.

SECTION 5. Subsection 32.0108(a) of Chapter 1 of Division 2 of Title 3 of the San Bernardino County Code is amended to read:

32.0108 Control of Animals.

Except as to Community Cats returned and released to their point of pick-(a) up as part of a TNVR program, nNo person owning or having control of any animal shall permit such animal to stray, to run at large upon any private or public street, sidewalk, school ground, public park, playground, place of public assembly or any other public place or upon any unenclosed private lot or other unenclosed private place or upon any private property without the consent of the owner or person in control thereof. Parkways comprising the area between the street and sidewalk shall be included as private property for purposes of this Section.

SECTION 6. Section 32.0208 of Chapter 2 of Division 2 of Title 3 of the San Bernardino County Code is amended to read:

32.0208 Vaccination.

- (a) Said rabies vaccination shall be performed only by a veterinarian who is duly licensed to practice in the State of California. Vaccination for rabies may be done in any veterinary clinic or hospital or in a low-cost rabies vaccination clinic sponsored by the County or any incorporated city.
- (b) A licensed veterinarian in the San Bernardino County Department of Public Health's jurisdiction who vaccinates an animal against rabies must immediately issue a certificate of vaccination signed by the veterinarian to the owner or custodian of the animal, stating:
- (1) The name and address of the owner or custodian of the vaccinated animal;
- (2) The type of vaccine used, the name of the manufacturer, the manufacturer's serial or lot number, and the date of the vaccination; and
 - (3) The breed, age, color, and sex of the vaccinated animal.

A duplicate certificate of vaccination must be submitted to the San Bernardino County Department of Public Health via mail, electronic transmission, or personal delivery on the 10th of each month, for any animal so vaccinated during the previous month. Electronic transmission is preferred.

SECTION 7. Section 32.1201 of Chapter 12 of Division 2 of Title 3 of the San Bernardino County Code is amended to read:

32.1201 Definitions.

For the purpose of this Chapter, the following definitions shall be used:

CAT. A<u>ll</u> domestic<u>ated</u> <u>cat</u> <u>felines</u> belonging to the <u>species</u> <u>genus</u> Felis <u>catus</u>domestica, including its young or kitten.

CATTERY. A place where five or more cats are kept. The term CATTERY shall not apply to animal shelters operated by governmental agencies, nor shall it apply to veterinary hospitals.

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Any CATTERY shall be in the proper A-I, A-2, DL, or M-I zone. In the A-I, DL and M-I zones, a location and development application involving a public hearing before the County Planning Commission must first be filed and approved by said Commission. In A-2 zone, the cattery is considered as a permitted use, not requiring the approval of a Location and Development Application.

A CATTERY is subdefined as follows:

- (1) BREEDING CATTERY. A cattery in which more than four cats are kept for the primary purpose of breeding.
- (2) BOARDING CATTERY. A cattery in which cats owned by persons other than the cattery owner/operator are being cared for.
- (3) BOARDING AND BREEDING CATTERY. A cattery in which cats are kept for boarding, breeding, marketing or other purposes.
- (4) PRIVATE CATTERY. A place wherein more than four but not exceeding five cats three months of age or older, all belonging to the same owner and kept or maintained as pets within the premises or residence of owner for his pleasure and enjoyment. No breeding in which the kittens are intended for sale or other commercial purpose must be done.

HEALTH OFFICER. The San Bernardino County Health Officer, or any other person duly authorized to act on his or her behalf.

SECTION 8. Subsection 32.1203(a) of Chapter 12 of Division 2 of Title 3 of the San Bernardino County Code is amended to read:

32.1203 Construction, Operation and Maintenance.

- (a) All cats <u>in a private or commercial cattery</u> shall be confined and not allowed to run at large.
- SECTION 9. The Board declares that it would have adopted this Ordinance and each section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of it irrespective of the fact
