IT IS HEREBY AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

This Interim Use Permit is for a period of eighteen days, Tuesday, September 8, 2026, through Friday, September 25, 2026, for the use of Glen Helen Regional Park for the Nocturnal Wonderland Event. San Bernardino County will receive revenue in the amount of \$73,478.78 for this use.

INTERIM USE PERMIT**

I. PARTIES

San Bernardino County, hereinafter referred to as COUNTY, hereby permits Live Nation Entertainment, Inc., hereinafter referred to as PERMITTEE, to utilize the entire Glen Helen Regional Park ("Park"), located at 2555 Glen Helen Parkway in San Bernardino, California for the Nocturnal Wonderland ("Event") and related activities.

II. USE AREA

PERMITTEE shall have the right to utilize the Park as depicted in **Exhibit "A"** Use Area, attached hereto and by this reference made a part hereof.

III. TERM

The term of this Permit shall be for eighteen (18) days, with the Event commencing **Friday, September 18, 2026**, through **Monday, September 21, 2026**, with related set-up occurring **Tuesday, September 8, 2026**, through **Thursday, September 17, 2026**, and tear-down that will take place **Tuesday, September 22, 2026**, through **Friday, September 25, 2026**, during **normal business hours**. Additionally, PERMITTEE's activities at the Use Area are limited to staging and activities related to this Event. Neither the Use Area, the Park, nor any part thereof may be used by PERMITTEE for any other purpose.

IV. USE FEES

A. Event Use Permit Preparation Fee in the amount of **two hundred dollars (\$200)** to be paid on the **date when executed signed contract is returned by PERMITTEE**.

B. Area Use:

PERMITTEE shall pay a:

1. Use Fee of **seventy-one thousand eight dollars and seventy-eight cents (\$71,008.78)** for the use of the Park as designated on **Exhibit "A"** to be paid by **3:00 PM Friday, August 21, 2026**. The Use Fee is broken down as follows:

- a. A fee of **forty-eight thousand dollars (\$48,000)** for a full park closure for four (4) days, September 18-21, 2026, at a rate of \$12,000 per day
- b. A fee of **twenty-thousand, seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$20,750)** for the use of 41.5 acres of open space between September 8, 2026, and September 25, 2026, at a rate of \$500 per acre.
- c. A fee of **one-thousand four hundred and thirty-nine dollars and eighty cents (\$1,439.80)** for chlorine, water, and utilities for pool maintenance from September 18, 2026, through September 20, 2026.
- d. A fee of **eight hundred eighteen dollars and ninety-eight cents (\$818.98)** for a General Service Worker and a Park Ranger II to maintain the pool after normal pool season.

2. Camping Fees in the amount of **two thousand two hundred seventy dollars (\$2,270)** for the use of camping spaces are as follows:
 - a. A fee of one thousand one hundred and seventy dollars **(\$1,170)** for the use of 26 non-hook-up sites for one night on Thursday, September 17, 2026, at a rate of \$45 per site per night.
 - b. A fee of one thousand one hundred dollars **(\$1,100)** for the use of 20 full hook-up sites for one night on Thursday, September 17, 2026, at a rate of \$55 per site per night.
3. Staffing fee: [Additional Charges]

If the Event takes place outside of the Park's normal working hours or extends beyond the contracted date and time, PERMITTEE will pay a fee for each staff listed below or combination of these, for each hour outside of the park's normal working hours where a staff remains on duty.

It is your responsibility to clean the pool facilities, restrooms included. Please restock, cleaning sinks, floors, toilets, walls/removing graffiti and stickers.

4. Additional Fees:
 - a. **An amendment fee of one-hundred dollars (\$100)** will be due if PERMITTEE requires substantive changes after the execution of this permit. This fee will be payable at the time of the amendment request.
 - a. **A cancellation fee of 10% of contract total**, excluding damage deposit will be payable to COUNTY if PERMITTEE terminates for convenience after execution of this permit with a minimum of thirty days before event date. Cancellation fee will be waived if cancelled at least 6 months prior to event date. Any cancellations for convenience within thirty days of the event PERMITTEE agrees to pay 100% of contract total excluding damage deposit.

- C. Fee Adjustments:
All COUNTY fees shall be adjusted without individual notice to PERMITTEE by enactment of future Board-approved revisions to the Regional Parks' Fee Ordinance.

D. Damage/Cleanup Deposit:

PERMITTEE is responsible to pay for damages incurred by the County due to the use of the Park by PERMITTEE, or persons allowed at the Park by PERMITTEE, including PERMITTEE's members, employees, volunteers and invitees or the Event or additional Event attendees, participants, spectators, guests, employees, or volunteers (collectively included and referred to herein as "PERMITTEE's guests").

The Park Superintendent and On Site Coordinator for PERMITTEE shall inspect the Use Area and Park both before and after the Event to determine the extent of any damages incurred. The COUNTY will invoice for any damages identified following final walk through.

E. All payments shall be made by money order, certified cashier's check, or credit card payable to San Bernardino County Regional Parks and delivered to Regional Parks Administrative Offices, located at 268 W. Hospitality Lane, Third Floor, Suite 303, San Bernardino, CA 92408. THIS PAYMENT WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED AT THE PARK.

F. Failure to Pay:

PERMITTEE agrees to pay all use and deposit payments when due and payable, or postmarked when due and payable and received within five (5) calendar days thereafter. For any payment not received PERMITTEE must pay to COUNTY an additional thirty-five dollars (\$35.00) for each late payment as an administrative processing charge. The parties agree that this late charge represents a fair and reasonable estimate of the costs that COUNTY will incur by reason of late payment by PERMITTEE. Acceptance of a late charge will not constitute a waiver of PERMITTEE's default with respect to the overdue amount nor prevent COUNTY from exercising any of the other rights and remedies available to COUNTY. Use fees not paid when due will bear simple interest from the date due until paid in full at the rate of 0.05% per day.

V. PERMITTEE'S RESPONSIBILITIES

- A. PERMITTEE agrees to provide staffing for the Event including but not limited to Parking Staff and Event Staff.
- B. PERMITTEE agrees to provide portable restrooms if attendance for the event is over 500 people in compliance with the Department of Environmental Health Special Event Portable Toilet Recommendations (Exhibit 'B', incorporated herein by reference).
- C. PERMITTEE agrees to provide adequate tables, chairs, and trash receptacles including assuming the responsibility for trash collection and bin removal.
- D. Litter pick-up and disposal is the responsibility of the PERMITTEE. PERMITTEE is responsible for picking up and disposing of all trash. The COUNTY has exclusive franchise agreements with various waste haulers in the unincorporated County areas for trash collection containers and hauling of the waste to the solid waste facility. PERMITTEE agrees to contact the trash hauler identified in the following list for the park being used for the EVENT:

Calico Regional Park: Burrtec
Glen Helen Regional Park: Burrtec
Mojave Narrows Regional Park: Advanced Disposal
Cucamonga-Guasti Regional Park: contact the City of Ontario
Prado Regional Park: contact the City of Chino
Yucaipa Regional Park: contact the City of Yucaipa

- E. PERMITTEE agrees to provide one (1) 40-cubic yard roll-away dumpster for every 500 people attending the event. Please verify with Park staff that this number of dumpsters is adequate. If

PERMITTEE has over 500 people and fails to provide dumpsters, the Department will invoice PERMITTEE for the actual cost of dumpster rental, plus a \$50 administration fee per dumpster.

- F. PERMITTEE agrees to be responsible for post-event cleaning. If PERMITTEE does not adhere to post-event clean-up, the Department will invoice PERMITTEE \$200 per 500 participants.
- G. PERMITTEE agrees to maintain restrooms after taking control over the Park – including at their own expense the supplies for stocking the restrooms.
- H. PERMITTEE agrees to provide any necessary lighting, if it is not available at the park.
- I. PERMITTEE agrees to provide example of the event parking passes or a guest list for the Event for entrance fees to be waived/discounted/tallied at the gate, as applicable to Entrance Fee terms in Paragraph IV. Subparagraph 3. Additionally, PERMITTEE will advise the Event attendees that if no pass is shown at the gate or their name is not listed on the guest list, the normal park entrance fee will be charged. No exceptions are provided.
- J. PERMITTEE agrees to provide State Certified Lifeguard staff for the swimming facility. A list of staff and copies of their current lifeguard certifications must be submitted to the Regional Parks Administration office no later than September 1, 2026
- K. PERMITTEE must submit a copy of their Lifeguard Plan for the swim facility to the Regional Parks Administration office no later than September 3, 2026.
- L. PERMITTEE will be required to implement the following safety measures for the swim facility during the Event:
 - a. Provide 1 lifeguard for every 50 patrons. (During Regional Parks' regular operation of the swim facility, one lifeguard for every 75 patrons is provided).
 - b. Providing security inside the swim complex and at the entry gates of the swim facility. Security must be provided at PERMITTEE'S sole expense.
 - c. Prohibiting alcohol within the swimming facility.
 - d. Denying access to the swim facility to intoxicated patrons.
- M. PERMITTEE agrees to operate the swim complex only during normal swim facility operation hours of 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. due to a lack of lighting in the lagoon.
- N. PERMITTEE agrees to provide venue security with K9s thoroughly searching all camping cars and patrons.
 - a. San Bernardino County Sheriffs must be present for all searches.
 - b. All security provisions are to be at the PERMITTEE'S sole expense.
- O. PERMITTEE agrees that all concert performances and amplified music will end at 12:00 am.
- P. PERMITTEE agrees to implement all actions recommended by the EDM Task Force as listed in Attachment B.

VI. REGIONAL PARKS BOOTH

If requested, PERMITTEE will allow Regional Parks to operate, at no charge, an information/public relation's booth during the Event and allows the sale of non-event pins, shirts, and other Regional Parks event tickets for the general public in the areas of the other booths. The location of the booth will be as agreed upon by PERMITTEE and Park Superintendent.

VII. EVENT PLAN

PERMITTEE shall submit its Event Plan ("Plan") to the Regional Park Administration office by **3:00 PM, Friday, August 21, 2026**, and shall, at the request of the COUNTY review the Plan with representatives of the COUNTY, including the Regional Parks. The Plan must outline specific security, parking, set up, and clean up, signage, advertisement, gate ingress, egress, sanitation, food, and vendor operations. PERMITTEE shall not be allowed to nor shall PERMITTEE allow the sale or distribution of alcoholic beverages at the EVENT without prior COUNTY approval and required licenses as applicable. The Plan shall include persons responsible, name of company, if applicable, times, electrical requirements, site plans, etc.

VIII. PARK RULES

PERMITTEE shall conform to and abide by all Park rules and regulations relating to the operation herein authorized and shall conform at all times to applicable rules, regulations, resolutions, ordinances, and statutes of SAN BERNARDINO COUNTY, State of California, the federal government, and all other governmental agencies where applicable; and where permits are required for such operations, the same must first be had and obtained from the regulating body having jurisdiction thereof, before such operation is undertaken.

IX. PERMITS AND APPROVALS

PERMITTEE shall obtain and maintain throughout the Event all necessary permits, licenses, and approvals from applicable federal, state and local agencies, including, but not limited to, San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department (security), San Bernardino County Environmental Health Services (sanitation, food/drink), California Highway Patrol (traffic), Caltrans (freeway access), San Bernardino County Transportation (roadways), and the California Division of Forestry; as required for any use allowed by COUNTY.

All necessary pre-event fee and deposits, permits, licenses and approvals shall be delivered to the Department of Regional Parks by **3:00 PM, Friday, August 21, 2026**.

X. NO DISCRIMINATION

During the term of the Use Permit, PERMITTEE shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender identity, gender expression, sexual orientation, age, or military and veteran status. PERMITTEE shall comply with Executive Orders 11246, 11375, 11625, 12138, 12432, 12250, 13672, Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the California Fair Housing and Employment Act and other applicable Federal, State and County laws and regulations and policies relating to equal employment and contracting opportunities, including laws and regulations hereafter enacted.

XI. NO SEGREGATION

PERMITTEE must not discriminate against or cause the segregation of any person or group of persons on account of race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, sex, age, physical handicap, medical condition or marital status in the occupancy, use, tenure or enjoyment of the Use Area used for the EVENT, nor may PERMITTEE or any person claiming under or through it, establish or permit any such practice or practices of discrimination or segregation with reference to the selection, location, number, use or occupancy of or by any person within the Use Area used for the EVENT.

XII. SECURITY

PERMITTEE understands and agrees that the COUNTY shall not be required to provide, nor shall COUNTY provide, any security for the personal property and/or the person of PERMITTEE or any of

PERMITTEE's members, guests or invitees. Any loss, damage and injury to any property or person of PERMITTEE or PERMITTEE's members, guests, or invitees shall be at the sole cost, expense, and responsibility of PERMITTEE.

XIII. INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE CLAUSE

- A. Indemnification - PERMITTEE agrees to indemnify, defend (with counsel reasonably approved by COUNTY) and hold harmless the COUNTY and its authorized officers, employees, agents and volunteers from any and all claims, actions, losses, damages, and/or liability arising out of this contract from any cause whatsoever, including the acts, errors or omissions of any person and for any costs or expenses incurred by the COUNTY on account of any claim except where such indemnification is prohibited by law. This indemnification provision shall apply regardless of the existence or degree of fault of indemnities. PERMITTEE's indemnification obligation applies to the COUNTY's "active" as well as "passive" negligence but does not apply to the COUNTY's "sole negligence" or "willful misconduct" within the meaning of Civil Code Section 2782.
- B. Additional Insured - All policies, except for the Workers' Compensation, Errors and Omissions and Professional Liability policies, shall contain endorsements naming the County and its officers, employees, agents and volunteers as additional insureds with respect to liabilities arising out of the performance of services hereunder. The additional insured endorsements shall not limit the scope of coverage for the County to vicarious liability but shall allow coverage for the County to the full extent provided by the policy. Such additional insured coverage shall be at least as broad as Additional Insured (Form B) endorsement form ISO, CG 2010.
- C. Waiver of Subrogation Rights - PERMITTEE shall require the carriers of required coverages to waive all rights of subrogation against the COUNTY, its officers, employees, agents, volunteers, contractors and subcontractors. All general or auto liability insurance coverage provided shall not prohibit PERMITTEE and PERMITTEE's employees or agents from waiving the right of subrogation prior to a loss or claim. PERMITTEE hereby waives all rights of subrogation against the COUNTY.
- D. Policies Primary and Non-Contributory - All policies required above are to be primary and non-contributory with any insurance or self-insurance programs carried or administered by the COUNTY.
- E. Severability of Interests - PERMITTEE agrees to ensure that coverage provided to meet these requirements is applicable separately to each insured and there will be no cross liability exclusions that preclude coverage for suits between PERMITTEE and the County or between the County and any other insured or additional insured under the policy.
- F. Proof of Coverage - The PERMITTEE shall furnish Certificates of Insurance to the Regional Parks Department Administration (268 W Hospitality Lane, Suite 303, San Bernardino, CA 92408), administering the contract evidencing the insurance coverage at the time the contract is executed, additional endorsements, as required shall be provided prior to the commencement of performance of services hereunder, which certificates shall provide that such insurance shall not be terminated or expire without thirty (30) days written notice to the Department, and PERMITTEE shall maintain such insurance from the time Contractor commences performance of services hereunder until the completion of such services. Within fifteen (15) days of the commencement of this contract, the Contractor shall furnish a copy of the Declaration page for all applicable policies and will provide complete certified copies of the policies and endorsements immediately upon request.
- G. Acceptability of Insurance Carrier - Unless otherwise approved by Risk Management, insurance shall be written by insurers authorized to do business in the State of California and with a minimum "Best" Insurance Guide rating of "A- VII".
- H. Deductibles and Self-Insured Retention - Any and all deductibles or self-insured retentions in excess of \$10,000 shall be declared to and approved by Risk Management.

- I. Failure to Procure Coverage – In the event that any policy of insurance required under this contract does not comply with the requirements, is not procured, or is canceled and not replaced, the COUNTY has the right but not the obligation or duty to cancel the contract or obtain insurance if it deems necessary and any premiums paid by the COUNTY will be promptly reimbursed by PERMITTEE or COUNTY payments to PERMITTEE will be reduced to pay for COUNTY purchased insurance.
- J. Insurance Review - Insurance requirements are subject to periodic review by the County. The Director of Risk Management or designee is authorized, but not required, to reduce, waive or suspend any insurance requirements whenever Risk Management determines that any of the required insurance is not available, is unreasonably priced, or is not needed to protect the interests of the County. In addition, the Director of Risk Management or designee is authorized, but not required, to change the above insurance requirements to require additional types of insurance coverage or higher coverage limits, provided that any such change is reasonable in light of past claims against the County, inflation, or any other item reasonably related to the County's risk.

Any change requiring additional types of insurance coverage or higher coverage limits must be made by amendment to this contract. PERMITTEE agrees to execute any such amendment within thirty (30) days of receipt.

Any failure, actual or alleged, on the part of the County to monitor or enforce compliance with any of the insurance and indemnification requirements will not be deemed as a waiver of any rights on the part of the County

XIV. INSURANCE SPECIFICATIONS

PERMITTEE agrees to provide insurance set forth in accordance with the requirements herein. If PERMITTEE uses existing coverage to comply with these requirements and that coverage does not meet the specified requirements, PERMITTEE agrees to amend, supplement or endorse the existing coverage to do so. The type(s) of insurance required is determined by the scope of the contract services.

Without in anyway affecting the indemnity herein provided and in addition thereto, PERMITTEE shall secure and maintain throughout the contract term the following types of insurance with limits as show:

- A. Workers' Compensation/Employers Liability – A program of Workers' Compensation insurance or a state-approved, self-insurance program in an amount and form to meet all applicable requirements of the Labor Code of the State of California, including Employer's Liability with \$250,000 limits covering all persons including volunteers providing services on behalf of PERMITTEE and all risks to such persons under this contract.

If Contractor has no employees, it may certify or warrant to the County that it does not currently have any employees or individuals who are defined as "employees" under the Labor Code and the requirement for Workers' Compensation coverage will be waived by the County's Director of Risk Management.

With respect to Contractors that are non-profit corporations organized under California or Federal law, volunteers for such entities are required to be covered by Workers' Compensation insurance.

- B. Commercial/General Liability Insurance – PERMITTEE shall carry General Liability Insurance covering all operations performed by or on behalf of PERMITTEE providing coverage for bodily injury and property damage with a combined single limit of not less than one million dollars **(\$1,000,000), per occurrence**. The policy coverage shall include:

1. Premises operation and mobile equipment.
2. Products and completed operations.
3. Broad form property damage (including completed operations).
4. Explosion, collapse and underground hazards.

5. Personal injury.
6. Contractual liability.
7. **\$2,000,000 general aggregate limit.**

- C. Automobile Liability Insurance – Primary insurance coverage shall be written on ISO Business Auto coverage form for all owned, hired and non-owned automobiles or symbol 1 (any auto). The policy shall have a combined single limit of not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for bodily injury and property damage, per occurrence.

If PERMITTEE is transporting one or more non-employee passengers, in performance of contract services, the automobile liability policy shall have a combined single limit of two million dollars (\$2,000,000) for bodily injury and property damage per occurrence.

If PERMITTEE owns no autos, a non-owned auto endorsement to the General Liability policy described above is acceptable.

- D. Special Event Liability Insurance – The County has a program to provide Special Event Liability Insurance to individuals and groups utilizing County facilities for activities not sponsored by the County, its Departments or Districts. This coverage provides one million (**\$1,000,000**) limits of liability for bodily injury and property damage and includes liquor liability coverage. It effectively transfers the liability from the County and its taxpayers to the agency/individual scheduling the activity or program. The coverage provides affordable rates to all non-County groups and individuals on a standard basis and still transfers the risk to an insurance company. Annual rates for ongoing activities are also available. **For additional information on this coverage contact local Parks office.**

- E. Umbrella Liability Insurance – An umbrella (over primary) or excess policy may be used to comply with limits or other primary coverage requirements. When used, the umbrella policy shall apply to bodily injury/property damage, personal injury/advertising injury and shall include a “dropdown” provision providing primary coverage for any liability not covered by the primary policy. The coverage shall also apply to automobile liability.

XV. NO ASSIGNMENT

No assignment of this Permit or any interest therein and no subpermit for any purpose shall be granted by PERMITTEE.

XVI. NOTICE

Any notice, demand request, consent, approval or communication that either party desires or is required to give to the other party or permitted to be given under this permit including notices under the California Unlawful Detainer Statutes, shall be given to the respective parties in writing either served personally or sent by United States first class mail, postage prepaid, registered or certified mail, postage return receipt requested. Any notice, demand, request, consent approval or communication that either party desires or is required to give to the other party shall be addressed to the other party at the address set forth below. Either party may change its address by notifying the other party of the change of address. Notice shall be deemed delivered and effective upon the earlier of (i) actual receipt or (ii) the date of delivery or refusal of the addressed to accept delivery if notice is sent by United States Mail, postage prepaid, certified or registered, return receipt requested.

Or at such other address or to such other persons as either of the parties may from time to time designate by written notice given as herein provided.

XVII. ATTORNEYS' FEES AND COSTS

If any legal action is instituted to enforce or declare any party's rights hereunder, each party, regardless of which party is the prevailing party, must bear its own costs and reasonable attorneys' fees. This paragraph shall not apply to those costs and attorneys' fees directly arising from any third party legal action against a party hereto and payable under Paragraph 13, INSURANCE AND INDEMNIFICATION CLAUSE.

XVIII. VENUE

The parties acknowledge and agree that this Permit was entered into and intended to be performed in whole or substantial part in San Bernardino County, California. The parties agree that the venue for any action or claim brought by any party to this Permit will be the San Bernardino County. Each party hereby waives any law or rule of court, which would allow them to request or demand a change of venue. If any action or claim concerning this Permit is brought by any third party, the parties agree to use their best efforts to obtain a change of venue to the Central District of San Bernardino County.

XIX. APPLICABLE LAW

This permit shall be interpreted and construed according to the laws of the State of California.

XX. FORCE MAJEURE

PERMITTEE and COUNTY shall not be deemed in violation of this permit if it is prevented from performing its obligations hereunder by reason of strikes, boycotts, labor disputes, embargoes, shortages of material, acts of God, acts of public enemy, acts of superior governmental authority, weather conditions, riots, rebellions, or any other circumstances for which it is not responsible or which are not within its control.

XXI. PUBLIC RECORDS DISCLOSURE OF INFORMATION

All information received by the COUNTY from any source concerning this Permit, including the Permit itself, may be treated by the COUNTY as public information subject to disclosure under the provisions of the California Public Records Act, Government Code Section 7920 et seq. (the "Public Records Act"). PERMITTEE understands that although all materials received by the COUNTY in connection with this Permit are intended for the exclusive use of the COUNTY, they are potentially subject to disclosure under the provisions of the Public Records Act. In the event a request for disclosure of any part or all of any information which a PERMITTEE has requested COUNTY to hold in confidence is made to the COUNTY, the COUNTY shall notify PERMITTEE of the request and shall thereafter disclose the requested information unless PERMITTEE, within five (5) days of receiving notice of the disclosure request, requests nondisclosure, provides COUNTY a legally sound basis for nondisclosure, and agrees to indemnify, defend with counsel approved by COUNTY, and hold the COUNTY harmless in any/all actions brought to require disclosure. PERMITTEE waives any and all claims for damages, lost profits, or other

injuries of any and all kinds in the event COUNTY fails to notify PERMITTEE of any such disclosure request and/or releases any information received concerning the Permit received from PERMITTEE.

XXII. NO ESTATE

PERMITTEE agrees that it does not and shall not claim at any time an interest or estate of any kind or extent whatsoever in the Use Area or Park, by virtue of this Permit or occupancy or use hereunder.

XXIII. TERMINATION

- A. **DEFAULT:** In the event that either party violates any of the terms and conditions of this permit, the aggrieved party shall give written notice of specific violation and demand for corrections.
- B. **TERMINATION FOR DEFAULT:** If, within one (1) day after written notice and demand, the violating party has not completely corrected this violation or shown acceptable cause therefore, the aggrieved party has the right to immediately terminate this Permit and pursue any and all remedies provided by law.
- C. PERMITTEE agrees that COUNTY may immediately suspend this Permit, and further, PERMITTEE agrees to immediately cease operations at the Event if PERMITTEE fails to meet the insurance requirements each year, as stated herein or for good cause as determined by the COUNTY.
- D. If this Permit is terminated because PERMITTEE is in breach of this Permit, all fees paid to the COUNTY shall be retained by the COUNTY and shall not be refunded to PERMITTEE.
- E. **LIABILITY FOR BREACH:** Termination for default shall not excuse either party from any liability for breach of Permit; such breach shall be deemed total.

XXIV. INTERPRETATIONS

As this Permit was jointly prepared by both parties, the language in all parts of this Permit will be construed, in all cases, according to its fair meaning, and not for or against either party hereto.

XXV. AUTHORIZED SIGNATORS

Both parties to this Permit represent that the signators executing this document are fully authorized to enter into this permit.

This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which so executed shall be deemed to be an original, and such counterparts shall together constitute one and the same Agreement. The parties shall be entitled to sign and transmit an electronic signature of this Agreement (whether by facsimile, PDF or other email transmission), which signature shall be binding on the party whose name is contained therein. Each party providing an electronic signature agrees to promptly execute and deliver to the other party an original signed Agreement upon request.

XXVI. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This Permit contains all of the agreements of the parties hereto with respect to any matter covered or mentioned in this Permit, and no prior agreement or understanding pertaining to any such matter is effective for any purpose.

ATTACHMENT B

Electronic Dance Music Task Force Subcommittee Recommendations for Glen Helen Amphitheater August 22, 2017, January 25, 2023, July 18, 2024

On September 27, 2016 (Item No. 63), the Board of Supervisors approved the formation of an Electronic Dance Music (EDM) Task Force. The purpose of this group was to develop recommendations for enforceable health and safety measures and procedures required for EDM events and all other concerts held on San Bernardino County (County) property. Additionally, the EDM Task Force was to seek input from the community and to consider changes to future EDM events and all other concerts to address community concerns.

The EDM Task Force includes representatives from the following County organizations:

- County Administrative Office
- Office of Emergency Services, Chair
- Office of County Counsel
- Department of Public Health
- Arrowhead Regional Medical Center
- San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department
- San Bernardino County Fire Protection District
- Regional Parks Department
- Inland Counties Emergency Medical Agency

After holding a series of public meetings where feedback from community representatives was received, the following recommendations are being presented for review by the Board of Supervisors.

COUNTYWIDE RECOMMENDATIONS

The following recommendations are being suggested for implementation at electronic dance music and all other concert events held on County property.

Site Safety

1. Complete an Event Operation Plan which includes accessibility for individuals with disabilities, addressing safety, security, and threats.
2. Ensure that evacuation routes are accessible for individuals with mobility impairments and that there are clear plans for assisting those who need help evacuating.
3. Conduct frequent trash collection to remove the potential fuel. This will aid in the prevention of fires being started in the venue by concert attendees.
4. Consider the need for increased food and beverage vendors to minimize crowd densities and reduce the build-up of large accumulations of patrons.
5. Ensure all vendors comply with health, safety, and accessibility standards.
6. Evaluate the venue's perimeter fence line for safety, operational efficiency by law enforcement, and provide ingress/egress of fire and emergency medical services (EMS).
7. Increase video surveillance capabilities/close circuit monitoring in and around the venue to aid Incident Command with overall situational awareness and early warning of crowd densities for immediate resource deployments to prevent major incidents, where applicable.
8. Ensure adequate vehicle barriers are deployed to prevent vehicle access into patron areas.
9. Coordinate/anticipate crowd movements to avoid choke points, stagnation, and potential crush situations.

Emergency Communication

1. Initiate the EDM Task Force County Notification Plan (Attachment B) within a reasonable amount of time from emergency assessment of an incident.
2. The Festival Emergency Manager and/or Festival Risk and Safety Manager is responsible for incident notification to the Office of Emergency Services Duty Officer.
3. Confirm that fire and law enforcement have been notified within a reasonable amount of time from emergency assessment of an incident.

Medical Response

1. Support the development of an ICEMA special event/mass gathering medical policy, with annual reviews. This policy would apply to all events and would require a medical plan to be submitted to ICEMA for review and approval.
 - a. Require all medical personnel to comply with applicable local, State, or County laws and ordinances, including credentialing requirements.
 - b. Require the use of appropriately licensed personnel to function within their specific scope of practice.
 - c. Identify a liaison responsible for access and functional needs considerations in medical response planning to ensure appropriate care and communication for individuals with disabilities.
2. Identify a liaison from the venue for the purpose of providing information from the venue that will assist medical responders with gathering accurate patient information in order to continue treating a patient who is transitioning from the venue to medical responder care.
3. Require event organizers to consult with the local first responder departments, such as County Fire, County Sheriff's, County Risk Management, County Public Health Department, County Public Works, ICEMA, OES, in the planning phase to ensure information sharing before the event.
4. Base any plan on predictive crowd attendance, size, and other considerations such as the history of substance use, legal or illegal, at previous or similar events.
5. Require an independent physician on-site to observe the medical care provided above the EMT and/or paramedic level of care.
6. Require emergency medical service personnel to comply with existing statutes and regulations concerning record-keeping and/or reporting during EDM events and all other concerts.
7. Require full reporting to ICEMA on the number and types of patients encountered and patient care reports that occurred during an event.

Traffic

1. Develop/revise traffic management plans that are dependent on-site limitations, the size of the event and surrounding community, and the appropriate location and maintenance

of emergency traffic lanes to be reviewed and approved by all relevant agencies at least 30 days prior to the event. The traffic management plans must include considerations for accessible transportation and parking for individuals with disabilities
2. Ensure traffic management plans are coordinated with and approved by the following agencies at least 30 days before the event:
 - a. San Bernardino County Public Works - Traffic and Permit Management Divisions - A traffic control permit will be required.
 - b. California Highway Patrol (CHP) Offices in the appropriate local jurisdiction
 - c. San Bernardino County Sheriff
 - d. San Bernardino County Fire
 - e. Office of Emergency Services
 - f. Local jurisdiction, if impacted

Public Education

1. Review and disseminate venue educational messages/messaging at least 14 days before the event through social media, email, and venue postings, and provide recommendations on content and distribution/posting of messages to concert attendees and the public by the most appropriate entity, with a focus on the following:
 - a. Importance of hearing protection
 - b. Importance of staying hydrated
 - c. Health effects of drug use
 - d. Weather safety
2. Dissemination of public information in accessible formats by the venue and/or promoter to local residents on specific event impacts prior to and during the event, including appropriate contact information, and specific directions for on-foot and vehicle travel and parking, etc.
3. Make hotline information for reporting purposes available to local residents and event attendees.

GLEN HELEN AMPHITHEATER RECOMMENDATIONS

The following recommendations are being suggested for implementation at EDM and all other concert events held at the Glen Helen Amphitheater in Devore.

Glen Helen Amphitheater-Related

1. Plan and manage events using the Incident Command System (ICS) and the National Incident Management System (NIMS) Model based on the pre-established size and scope of events, with mandatory relevant ICS and NIMS training for all relevant personnel at least once a year.
2. Determine the threat assessment of each event and develop an Event Action Plan (EAP) as part of the Event Operational Plan to address safety, medical, and health issues to include a reference to FEMA planning for large-scale concerts/special events.
3. Complete a pre-event coordination meeting and an after-action report following each event, with participation from all parties involved, including the agency responsible for the venue, all required health and safety personnel, and relevant stakeholders from the County.
4. Consider the use of automated identification systems at all entrances to the event for concerts with specific age restrictions, in which the venue is responsible for enforcing strict identification and age checks for all attendees.
5. Limit capacity to approved space requirements determined by the jurisdictional fire agency and defined for each venue as part of the Event Operation Plan.
 - a. Determine occupant loads for stadium/arena areas and open areas.
 - b. Keep all emergency routes clear for emergency services.
6. Require an event conclusion period:
 - a. Conclude music sets/performances at an established time.
 - b. Cease alcohol sales at least 30 minutes before the scheduled conclusion of the last music set/performance (excluding cool down time).
7. Require appropriate stage protection and security (e.g., concert barricade, standard security compound) as determined by public safety and security personnel.
8. Require appropriate perimeter fencing (to prevent fence jumpers and gate crashers and for the safety of attendees) as determined by public safety personnel.
9. Require appropriate interior fencing (e.g., to separate General Admission, seating, and VIP areas) as determined by public safety and security personnel.
10. Appropriate dispositions will be applied to any and all fence jumpers or gate crashers.
11. Ensure access to safe transportation (e.g. taxicab or ride-share service or parental pick-up) for attendees leaving the venue, and include staging for ride-share and taxi services.
12. Contingency plans will be in place for all large-scale events that will potentially place strains on existing public safety agencies. These plans outline an emergency response by all parties who may respond to an emergency situation during an event. This can range from cancellation of an event due to weather conditions, identifying heavy equipment that could be required in a catastrophe, to requiring a grid-type

venue plan that identifies vendor locations or booths with numbers.

County Code / Legal Authority

1. Prohibiting alcohol in the parking lot at special events would be advisable. This would require amending the current County Code.
2. Require the event promoter print on the ticket that alcohol is not allowed in the parking lot and violators risk not gaining access to the venue if violated.
3. Consider alternative enforcement options regarding the enforcement of any parking lot alcohol ban, particularly due to the impact of AB 953 (requiring local law enforcement agencies to report data on all stops conducted by officers, including time, date, location of the stop, reason for the stop, result of the stop, and perceived race or ethnicity, gender, and approximate age of the person stopped) and reporting requirements for the Sheriff to report all contacts with the public.

Policy Considerations

1. Develop a policy to establish a minimum age threshold of 18 years old at EDM events held on County property.
2. Develop a concert end time at EDM events and concerts held on County property.
 - a. On June 9, 2017, a document was provided to the Task Force titled "Devore Community Requirements". The first item on the list is a request to end all events at 11 p.m. The full list is available upon request.
