1. PROBLEM STATEMENT

The San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department Scientific Investigations Division (SBCSD-SID) provides service to all law enforcement agencies within San Bernardino County. SBCSD-SID gained accreditation initially in 1995 under the American Society of Crime. Until 2016, Laboratory Directors – Laboratory Accreditation Board (ASCLD-LAB) and maintained accreditation. In 2016, the laboratory became accredited under the International Organization for Standardization / International Electrotechnical Commission (ISO / IEC) I7025 standard by ANSI National Accreditation Board (<u>ANAB</u>) and has maintained accreditation since.

San Bernardino County is the largest county in the continental United States. There are over 2.2 million residents in San Bernardino County and the population continues to rise annually. It is the 5th most populous county in California and the 14th most populous County in the United States. In 2019, California was reported by the California DMV to have 88,043 DUI convictions. San Bernardino accounts for 4,425 of those convictions. These convictions fall into the following categories:

- 1. Misdemeanor 4,114
- 2. Felony 299
- 3. Under 21 12
- 4. Reckless 830

The median Blood Alcohol Concentration (BAC) in CA is 0.16, two times the legal limit. In San Bernardino County convictions of males (71.5%) outweighs females (23.9%); 4.6% did not specify gender. 41.1% of the convictions in San Bernardino County are of individuals in the 21-30 age category.

In 2017, the California Department of Public Health updated <u>Title 17</u>. Title 17 regulates forensic breath alcohol analysis and contains the requirements and qualifications to perform Forensic Alcohol Analysis. For law enforcement use, the breath alcohol program must be under a government forensic laboratory and training, calibration, service, and testimony must be performed by a Forensic Alcohol Analyst.

SBCSD-SID provides all evidentiary instruments, service, calibration, training, and testimony for all law enforcement agencies within the county. These instruments are placed strategically throughout San Bernardino County to facilitate timely breath alcohol testing of subjects for deputies and officers. These evidentiary instruments, service, calibration, training, and testimony is provided throughout San Bernardino County without cost to agencies. The Breath Alcohol Program at SBCSD-SID supports the evidentiary testing of subjects and the adjudication of breath alcohol cases throughout San Bernardino County.

The SBCSD-SID does not have a budget for the replacement of these instruments. SBCSD-SID currently has 46 EC/IR II (desktop) evidentiary instruments, 37 which are deployed in the field, and 35 VXL (portable/handheld) evidentiary instruments, 25 of which are deployed in the field. The laboratory must maintain instruments for training all operators in San Bernardino County and for replacement when instruments must be serviced or repaired. An average of 3881 evidentiary tests are conducted annually in San Bernardino County, based the last three years statistics.

The portable/handheld Alco-Sensor VXL evidentiary instruments were purchased in 2014 and have surpassed their planned service life of 7 years. The portable/handheld Alco-Sensor VXL evidentiary instruments have gained considerable popularity with patrol deputies and officers. The need now exceeds the current 35 instruments. A minimum of 10 additional Alco-Sensor VXL instruments are needed to meet the demand, bringing the total number of Alco-Sensor VXL evidentiary instruments needed to 45. The desktop EC/IR II evidentiary instruments were purchased in 2012 and have surpassed their planned service life of 10 years. 46 EC/IR II evidentiary instruments are needed to replace the current instruments.

The SBCSD-SID is the only governmental forensic laboratory in San Bernardino County with a breath alcohol program operated by Forensic Alcohol Analysts, as required by Title 17. The instruments, training, calibration, service, and testimony are provided without charge by SBCSD-SID. A financial investment in

new instruments for the Breath Alcohol program supports all law enforcement agencies and the judicial system in San Bernardino County.

SBCSD-SID also provides blood alcohol testing and testimony for all law enforcement agencies within the county. Current instrumentation used in blood alcohol testing includes a direct inject Gas Chromatograph and Head Space Gas Chromatograph (GC). The Head Space GC is over 12 years old and was originally purchased to replace the direct inject GC which is over 20 years old. Unfortunately, the Head Space GC has been out of service most of its life due to software and programming issues, supply issues, network issues and changes in personnel.

SBCSD-SID is the only lab to still have a direct inject GC in use and it is well past its service life. The need for repairs has increased over the last several years. Each time the instrument is taken out of service for repair, blood alcohol testing is halted as seen in the increase in testing turnaround times (TAT). The average testing TAT was 36 days in 2022, 58 days in 2023 and 96 days in the first quarter of 2024 and 200 days as of August 1st, 2024. This latest increase in TAT, was a result of the most recent repair issue involving the data collection integrator used with the direct inject GC. In May 2024, the integrator broke and could not be repaired because the replacement parts are no longer available to purchase. Blood alcohol testing immediately stopped. Three months later, blood alcohol testing resumed after locating an alternate data collection software, programming it to work with our lab method, and completing an inhouse verification. Failure to provide blood alcohol testing caused an increase in case backlog, a dramatic increase in TAT and more importantly negatively affected our law enforcement customers as well as the Department of Motor Vehicles as they waited for testing to resume.

The purchase of two Head Space GC instruments would replace both outdated lab instruments. Advancements in instrumentation will continue to allow the lab to meet Title 17. Having two instruments would ensure blood alcohol testing continues uninterrupted and allow the lab to return to a two-week TAT. Purchasing two of the same make and model will decrease the time needed to complete the validation/verification process. It will also decrease training time, streamline the testing workflow by having one method and procedure, and allow for the sharing of supplies thus streamlining the purchasing process.

Media Requirements

If unable to attend, email the OTS PIO and coordinator brief highlights and/or results, including any media coverage (broadcast, digital, print) of event within 7 days following significant grant-related event or program. Media and program highlights are to be reflected in QPRs.
- Any press releases, work plans, scripts, storyboards, artwork, graphics, videos or any
 educational or informational materials that received OTS PIO approval in a prior grant year needs
 to be resubmitted for approval in the current grant year.
- For additional guidance, refer to the <u>OTS Grants Materials Approval Process Guidelines</u> and <u>OTS Grants Media Approval Process FAQs</u> on the OTS website.
- Contact the OTS PIO or your OTS grant coordinator for consultation when changes from any of the above requirements might be warranted.

- Collect, analyze and report statistical data relating to the grant goals and objectives.

Using the data compiled during the grant, the Grant Director will complete the "Final Evaluation" section in the fourth/final Quarterly Performance Report (QPR). The Final Evaluation should provide a brief summary of the grant's accomplishments, challenges and significant activities. This narrative should also include whether goals and objectives were met, exceeded, or an explanation of why objectives were not completed.

5. ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT

This program has full administrative support, and every effort will be made to continue the grant activities after grant conclusion.

In accordance with the Acts, the Regulations, and other pertinent directives, circulars, policy, memoranda, and/or guidance, the Recipient hereby gives assurance that it will promptly take any measures necessary to ensure that:

"No person in the United States shall, on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity, for which the Recipient receives Federal financial assistance from DOT, including NHTSA."

The Recipient will insert the following notification in all solicitations for bids, Requests For Proposals for work, or material subject to the Acts and the Regulations made in connection with all Highway Safety Grant Programs and, in adapted form, in all proposals for negotiated agreements regardless of funding source: "The [name of Recipient], in accordance with the provisions of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (78 Stat. 252, 42 U.S.C 2000d to 2000d-4) and the Regulations, hereby notifies all bidders that it will affirmatively ensure that in any contract entered into pursuant to this advertisement, disadvantaged business enterprises will be afforded full and fair opportunity to submit bids in response to this invitation and will not be discriminated against on the grounds of race, color, or national origin in consideration for an award."
- 3. The Recipient will insert the clauses of appendix A and E of this Assurance (also referred to as DOT Order 1050.2A) in every contract or agreement subject to the Acts and the Regulations.
- The Recipient will insert the clauses of appendix B of DOT Order 1050.2A, as a covenant running with the land, in any deed from the United States effecting or recording a transfer of real property, structures, use, or improvements thereon or interest therein to a Recipient.
- 5. That where the Recipient receives Federal financial assistance to construct a facility, or part of a facility, the Assurance will extend to the entire facility and facilities operated in connection therewith.
- 6. That where the Recipient receives Federal financial assistance in the form of, or for the acquisition of, real property or an interest in real property, the Assurance will extend to rights to space on, over, or under such property.

Additionally, you must comply with all other reporting, data collection, and evaluation requirements, as prescribed by law or detailed in program guidance.

The State highway safety agency gives this ASSURANCE in consideration of and for obtaining any Federal grants, loans, contracts, agreements, property, and/or discounts, or other Federal-aid and Federal financial assistance extended after the date hereof to the recipients by the U.S. Department of Transportation under the Highway Safety Grant Program. This ASSURANCE is binding on the State highway safety agency, other recipients, sub-recipients, sub-grantees, contractors, subcontractors and their subcontractors', transferees, successors in interest, and any other participants in the Highway Safety Grant Program. The person(s) signing below is/are authorized to sign this ASSURANCE on behalf of the Recipient.

THE DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE ACT OF 1988 (41 U.S.C. 8103)

 of interest is found to exist, NHTSA may (a) terminate the award, or (b) determine that it is otherwise in the best
 interest of NHTSA to continue the award and include appropriate provisions to mitigate or avoid such conflict.
- 3. Conflicts of interest that require disclosure include all past, present, or currently planned organizational, financial, contractual, or other interest(s) with an organization regulated by NHTSA or with an organization whose interests may be substantially affected by NHTSA activities, and which are related to this award. The interest(s) that require disclosure include those of any recipient, affiliate, proposed consultant, proposed subcontractor, and key personnel of any of the above. Past interest shall be limited to within one year of the date of award. PROHIBITION ON USING GRANT FUNDS TO CHECK FOR HELMET USAGE

In accordance with Executive Order 13043, Increasing Seat Belt Use in the United States, dated April 16, 1997, the Grantee is encouraged to adopt and enforce on-the-job seat belt use policies and programs for its employees when operating company-owned, rented, or personally-owned vehicles. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) is responsible for providing leadership and guidance in support of this Presidential initiative. For information and resources on traffic safety programs and policies for employers, please contact the Network of Employers for Traffic Safety (NETS), a public-private partnership dedicated to improving the traffic safety practices of employers and employees. POLICY ON BANNING TEXT MESSAGING WHILE DRIVING

In accordance with Executive Order 13513, Federal Leadership On Reducing Text Messaging While Driving, and DOT Order 3902.10, Text Messaging While Driving, States are encouraged to adopt and enforce workplace safety policies to decrease crashes caused by distracted driving, including policies to ban text messaging while driving company-owned or rented vehicles, Government-owned, leased or rented vehicles, or privately-owned vehicles when on official Government business or when performing any work on or behalf of the Government. States are also encouraged to conduct workplace safety initiatives in a manner commensurate with the size of the business, such as establishment of new rules and programs or re-evaluation of existing programs to prohibit text messaging while driving, and education, awareness, and other outreach to employees about the safety risks associated with texting while driving.
