

NOTICE OF VACANCY

The Inland Empire Resource Conservation District has accepted the resignation of Paul C. Williams, a member of the District's Board of Directors. As provided in Section 9316 of the California Public Resources Code, in case of a vacancy in the office of director appointed pursuant to Section 9314, the vacancy shall be filled, as provided in Section 9314, by appointment for the unexpired term by the Board of Supervisors of the principal County. Mr. Williams was appointed pursuant to Section 9314 on December 15, 2020 for a four year term.

The Board of Supervisors of the County of San Bernardino, following consultation with the Riverside County Board of Supervisors, will appoint a member to the Board of Directors to fill the unexpired term. QUALIFICATIONS: A member of the Board of Directors of the Inland Empire Resource Conservation District must be a registered voter in the state, and (1) reside within the district comprised wholly or partially of the cities or communities of Banning, Beaumont, Big Bear, Cabazon, Calimesa, Cherry Valley, Chino, Fontana, Highland, Loma Linda, Mentone, Montclair, Oak Glen, Ontario, Rancho Cucamonga, Redlands, Rialto, San Bernardino, Yucaipa, Riverside and surrounding areas extending northward into the San Bernardino National Forest in the Cajon Pass area, and either own real property in the district or have served for two years or more as an associate director providing advisory or other assistance to the district directors, or (2) be a designated agent of a resident landowner within the district.

A member should have a demonstrated interest in soil and water conservation.
