Indigent Defense Program - Proposal Narrative

<u>Introduction</u>

The San Bernardino County Public Defender (SBCPD) is cognizant that meaningful criminal justice reform requires legislative initiatives, appropriate funding, and dedicated resources to defend constitutional rights by pursuing litigation. The State Legislature's success in driving reforms to criminal sentencing and parole reflects a commitment and responsible approach to decarceration. By making funding available, through the Public Defense Pilot Program (PDPP), the Legislature supplements local efforts to bring to fruition the goal of reform for some categories of criminal cases. SBCPD has developed the Second Chance Program to advance and effectuate these reform efforts. By creating three distinct units, SBCPD seeks to create meaningful change within San Bernardino County.

PC 1170(d)(1) "Second Look" Unit

Because San Bernardino County underutilizes the resentencing reduction provision of Penal Code (PC) section 1170(d)(1), the Legislature's commitment to reform has not been fully realized. Exciting new amendments to 1170 require appointment of counsel, a meaningful hearing, timeframes, and a presumption in favor of resentencing. The court must also consider whether the defendant has experienced trauma, was a victim of intimate partner violence or human trafficking prior to the time the offense was committed, or if the defendant was under age 26. SBCPD expects these changes to drastically increase the number of petitions granted and the resources required to prepare and litigate contested hearings.

PC 1170(d) also authorizes the district attorney to request reduction of a sentence. SBCPD regularly receives letters from clients in California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR) custody requesting assistance in sending mitigation materials to the San Bernardino County District Attorney (DA) in support of a PC 1170(d) sentence reduction request. With existing resources, SBCPD has only been able to send one comprehensive mitigation and 1170(d) request to the DA's office thus far.

The PDPP grant will permit the SBCPD's "Second Look" Unit, consisting of two attorneys and one office assistant, to (1) present evidence of relevant mitigation, including expert testimony, at hearings on CDCR-initiated resentencing requests, and (2) prepare and submit comprehensive mitigation packets in support of 1170(d) resentencing requests to the DA's office in appropriate cases. These efforts will implement the Legislature's goal to provide a "second" look at extreme and disproportionate sentences.

<u>Homicide Resentencing Unit - PC 1170.95</u>

Since 2018, SBCPD has received 162 PC section 1170.95 felony murder resentencing petitions, of which approximately 80 cases are pending because SBCPD has been unable to devote full-time attorney resources to section 1170.95 felony murder cases. When SB 775 expands section 1170.95 to include attempted murder and manslaughter on January 1, 2022, SBCPD expects the number of petitions to double. Additionally, approximately 30 cases will likely be remanded from the appellate court upon reversal of the trial court's incorrect finding that the law was unconstitutional. Since section 1170.95 cases are time- and work-intensive, requiring the same, or sometimes more, preparation than a homicide jury trial, it has become increasingly obvious that existing staff cannot handle the current and expanding case volume.

The PDPP will permit SBCPD Homicide Resentencing Unit, consisting of two attorneys, one paralegal, and one office assistant, to identify each SBCPD client entitled to resentencing and pursue the resentencing process for the hundreds of cases that are currently pending.

Franklin/Youth Offender Unit - PC 3051

In 2016, the SBCPD received a list of approximately 2,800 San Bernardino County youth offender clients who will qualify for a section PC 3051 hearing. CDCR records indicate that approximately 400 of San Bernardino County clients are still in need of a *Franklin* hearing. SBCPD's section 3051 objectives are to: (1) increase the number of section 3051 submissions by 30-40 cases each year, and (2) dedicate attorneys, well-trained in developments in adolescent brain development, to handle youth offender cases at the earliest opportunity.

To achieve these objectives, the SBCPD will add three attorneys and one office assistant to the current *Franklin* Unit to continue to prepare clients for their youth offender parole hearing. SBCPD will add a sentencing/mitigation expert to prepare and submit *Franklin* mitigation to the court or the Board of Parole Hearings. SBCPD does not currently employ mitigation experts or other staff who can diagnose clients for mental and or developmental disabilities. To complete the additional 30-40 cases, SBCPD will utilize outside mitigation experts to assist with these cases. SBCPD will designate one attorney, certified in juvenile law, to represent youth offenders at the earliest opportunity. Currently, SBCPD only has juvenile attorneys handle cases until the case is transferred to adult court. The proposal will ensure vertical representation of a youth offender by a specially trained attorney who can continue to gather evidence on increased growth and maturity to assure the client has a meaningful opportunity for release consistent with the aims of *Miller v. Alabama* and section 3051.

Conclusion

SBCPD is confident that its Second Chance Program will achieve meaningful change for many San Bernardino County clients, their families and our communities and further the Legislature's goals for criminal justice reform.
