



Partnership and Collaborative Efforts


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- Providing more than just affordable housing and housing subsidies by:
 - Connecting families to services and partners in the community
 - Expanding traditional affordable housing programs into innovative programs that assist in improving a family's well being
 - Offering on-site or in-office educational, career, professional, and social services for the families served
- Saving tax-payer dollars by:
 - Maximizing our community and government resources by leveraging funding and in-kind services, and sharing data on mutual customers
 - Breaking down silos and working collaboratively with others
 - Thinking innovatively to deliver programs and services more efficiently and in a cost effective manner
 - Holding families served more accountable
- Doing more than just housing is not mandated by HUD – we rely on our partners:
 - No additional funding is provided for anything other than housing assistance payments
 - No capital funds for development
 - No additional funding for supportive/career services

- Long standing history of partnerships
 - Oldest partnership dates back to the 1960s, became first housing authority West of the Mississippi to have a medical clinic on a Public Housing site...and still stands today as the Whitney Young Clinic at our Maplewood Homes Affordable Housing site (San Bernardino)

- Andalusia Apartments – 168 unit new condominium development in Victorville acquired and completed by HACSB in 2009 for a total cost of around \$80,000 per unit.
